Tuesday, November 6, 2018, is **General Election day** in the United States. As a registered voter, you have the opportunity to exercise your right to vote on a variety of federal, state, county, and city contests. The contests and measures that appear on your ballot are dependent on the districts in which you reside. Additionally, there are several state measures for voters to consider.

The County Clerk publishes the **Benton County Voters' Pamphlet** as an insert to the State Voters' Pamphlet to provide local candidates the opportunity to share their messages and views with voters. Candidate Statements are an optional filing and not all candidates choose to file a statement.

Ballots must be received at any official ballot drop site in Oregon by 8:00 p.m. on Election Day, Tuesday, November 6, 2018. You can mail your ballot or drop it at one of the ballot drop box locations listed in this pamphlet.

Great Neighborhoods: The City initiated a study to get your advice on city planning. I suggested the study be called "Great Neighborhoods". **I support revisiting the Great Neighborhoods project.**

Zoning: Single family neighborhoods should be zoned as such. **I advocate for single family zoning in single family neighborhoods**.

Urban renewal: Urban renewal has done great things for Downtown. **Its time to be done with moratoriums and get going with the program.**

Traffic: A bridge downriver connecting Springhill Dr. to Conser Rd. in Millersburg will allow north-bound Corvallis and N. Albany traffic to by-pass Hwy. 20 and downtown Albany. **This will relieve congestion in N. Albany and on Springhill in particular.**

Numerous citizens have expressed distress about approval of housing developments within the past year. Essentially a decade or more's worth of normal residential growth - postponed by the Great Recession - has overtaken systematic planning.

There are three additional factors:

- 1) Oregon Land use Statues.
- 2) The State Legislature's overriding of voter approved annexations. Philomath filed suit to overturn this ruling, but it may take another year or so to arrive at a final judicial decision. In the meantime the City Council's hands are tied by the State.
- 3) Philomath's Development Code stipulates requirements for development and when the conditions are met as communicated through 'Findings of Fact', a majority 'no' vote puts the City at legal risk and an appeal to LUBA, which means your tax money flows out to attorneys to defend the City.

As a current Councilor, I am frustrated by legal requirements that impede the will of the people, but there is a way that may restore balance. If reelected, I will continue to actively engage with Council colleagues and the City Manager to work on revising Philomath's Development Code in order to ensure our City infrastructure can handle whatever future development proposals arise.

In addition to development, another pressing issue is the City budget. I am committed to having the general fund service fee sunset as agreed within the City ordinance. At the same time, it is absolutely necessary for future viability, that contributions to City reserves be sustained, while keeping operational expenses as low as possible commensurate with citizen service and safety.

Ridgewood Road District Measure 2-120

Ballot Title

Caption: Ridgewood Road District One Year Local Option Tax

Question: Shall the District impose a one year additional tax of \$3.00 per \$1,000 of assessed value for 2019-2020 road maintenance? This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

Summary: If approved, the Ridgewood Road District estimates the measure will result in approximately \$60,700.00 of additional tax proceeds (representing an average of \$1,145.00 per household in the District) that will be used to slurry or chip seal the roads in the District in the summer of 2020. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of estimate and may reflect the impact of early payment discounts, compression and the collection rate. The proposed additional tax rate will only be in effect for the 2019-2020 tax year.

Explanatory Statement

The Ridgewood Road District is comprised of 53 households located on Ridgewood Drive, Ridgewood Place, Heather Drive, Fuchsia Drive and Magnolia Drive in Corvallis. The District annually assesses property tax at a permanent rate of \$0.6435 per \$1,000 of assessed property value to fund road maintenance and repairs.

Proper maintenance of these roads requires slurry or chip sealing every 7-10 years. The last chip seal was performed in summer 2008. Current reserve funds are not sufficient to complete both the sealing and conduct annual routine maintenance of the roads. The purpose of this ballot measure is to impose an additional one-year only tax of \$3.00 per \$1,000 of assessed value for the 2019-2020 year to cover the costs of slurry or chip sealing in summer 2020. If approved, the Ridgewood Road District estimates the measure will result in approximately \$60,700.00 of additional tax proceeds (representing an average of \$1,145.00 per household in the District). The proposed additional tax rate will only be in effect for the 2019-2020 tax year.

For this measure to take effect, a majority of votes cast in the election by Ridgewood Road District residents must be "Yes".

Should the measure fail to pass, the roads will not be sealed. Failure to seal the roads will accelerate deterioration of the roads thus requiring more extensive and costly repaving repairs in the future.
