Tuesday, November 3, 2020, is General Election day in Oregon. As a registered voter, you have the opportunity to exercise your right to vote on a variety of federal, state, county, and city contests. The contests and measures that appear on your ballot are dependent on the districts in which you reside. Additionally, there are several state measures for voters to consider.

The County Clerk publishes the Benton County Voters' Pamphlet. Each candidate has the opportunity to issue a statement about themselves for inclusion in this pamphlet. For voters with a local measure on their ballot, proponents and opponents of measures have the opportunity to submit arguments for or against local measures in this pamphlet. There is a **digital version of this pamphlet** available on the Elections Office website located at www.co.benton.or.us/elections.

General Election ballots must be received at an official ballot drop site within the State of Oregon by 8:00 PM on Election Day, Tuesday, November 3, 2020. You can mail your ballot using the postage paid ballot return envelope, or drop it at one of the official ballot drop box locations listed in this pamphlet and on our website. For additional information or assistance, please contact the Elections Office by phone: 541-766-6756; email: elections@co.benton.or.us or in-person in the basement of the historic Benton County Courthouse, 120 NW 4th Street, Room 13, in Corvallis.

Please return your ballot by mail before October 28, 2020, to ensure receipt at the Elections Office by the 8:00 PM November 3rd deadline. After this date, we recommend using one of our many Official Ballot Drop Sites located throughout the county and listed on page 32 in this pamphlet.

We hope this pamphlet provides helpful information about candidates and other choices you are presented with in this election.

NEW! Prepaid Postage Ballot Return Envelope


With prepaid postage, you no longer have to search for a stamp to mail your voted ballot. Beginning this year, all ballots in Oregon will be sent to voters with a prepaid postage return envelope.

When you mail back your voted ballot, the Post Office will charge the State of Oregon for each ballot sent back to an Elections Office. Only ballots sent back through the mail will be charged to the State.

Important notice: Postmarks **do not** count for ballots in Oregon. If we have not received your ballot by 8:00 PM on Election night, your vote **will not count**.

Please return your ballot by mail before October 28, 2020, to ensure receipt at the Elections Office by the 8:00 PM November 3rd deadline. After October 17, 2020, use an Official Ballot Drop Site in Oregon. Benton County Official Drop Sites are listed on page 32.

Citizens aren't just concerned with the traffic speeds on the main roads, but the vehicles that are speeding through their neighborhoods. We should implement a Neighborhood Traffic Management Program (and budget for solutions) which would provide a formalized process for citizens concerned about traffic on their neighborhood streets.

Water Availability: Our Water System Master Plan states that our city should "try to attract 'dry' or low water consumption users rather than large 'wet' industries that require large quantities of water." The Philomath Strategic Plan needs to reflect that advice.



Ballot Title

Caption: Charter Amendment: Mayor and Council Terms and Qualifications

Question: Shall the Charter be amended to limit Elected Officers to three four-year terms, staggered Council terms, and longer residency?

Summary: If adopted by the voters, this Charter Amendment would do the following:

- 1. Replace current Section 3.4 of the Charter with language establishing staggered, 4-year Council terms. Three Councilors would be elected to 4-year terms in 2022; the other three would continue with two-year terms until 2024. After the 2024 election, all Councilors would serve 4-year terms.
- 2. Replace current Section 3.5 of the Charter with language establishing a four-year term for Mayor, beginning with the 2024 election.
- 3. Change current Section 3.8(3), extending the term limits for all Elected Officers (the Mayor and City Council) from the current total of ten years to no more than three four-year terms (with an exception for Council members appointed to fill a part of a Council term of less than two years).
- 4. Change current Section 3.8(1), extending the residency requirement for Elected Officers from 6 months to 12 months. 5. The complete text of the proposed charter amendment is on file with the City Recorder.

Explanatory Statement

This measure proposes to change the City Charter sections about elective officers in the following five ways:

The City Charter currently provides that the Mayor and City Council all serve two-year terms, with these terms beginning and ending at the same time and on the same election cycle.

- If this measure is passed by the voters, Councilors would be elected to serve staggered, four-year terms. Three Councilors would serve four-year terms as the result of the 2022 election, with the remaining three Council positions elected to a two-year term. At the end of the two-year term, these three positions would then serve four-year terms.
- 2. If this measure is passed by the voters, the Mayor would also be elected to a four-year term, beginning in 2024.
- If this measure is passed, to start these staggered terms, and only for the 2022 election, candidates for Council positions would inform the City Election Official of whether the candidate's preference is to serve a fouryear term or a two-year term. If the 2022 election results in six successful candidates, with three whose preference is to serve a four-year term and three whose preference is to serve a two-year term, the new Councilors will serve the term lengths that each one preferred. If the 2022 election results do not align with the candidates' preferences, or if there is any other disagreement regarding who serves which length of term, the three Councilors elected in 2022 with the highest number of votes shall each serve a term of four years, and the three Councilors elected in 2022 with the lowest number of votes shall each serve a term of two years

The Charter currently requires a person to be a resident for six months to be eligible to be an elected officer. The residency requirement for appointive positions will continue to be six months

 If this measure passes, to be an eligible candidate for any elected office, a person would need to be a resident of the City of Philomath for at least 12 months prior to the election.

The Charter currently limits terms to ten years.

5. If this measure passes, all elected officers would be limited to a maximum of three, four-year terms. If a Council member is appointed to fill a vacancy, the term would be counted as a term for the term limit if the appointment is for two years or more, and would not be counted as a term for the term limit if the appointment is for less than two years.

Brownly-Marshall Road District Measure 2-127

Ballot Title

Caption: Renew of Local Option Tax for Operations

Question: Shall the district renew \$0.20 per \$1000 of assessed value tax for general operations for five years beginning 2021-2022?

Summary: Passage of this local option tax will allow the Brownly-Marshall Road District to continue to provide road maintenance and repair at approximately the same level of service as previous years. If the measure does not pass maintenance and repair services will be reduced, primarily by reducing dust control.

The district currently has a permanent tax rate limit of \$0.9301 per \$1000 of assessed value and a local option tax of \$0.20 per \$1000 of assessed value which expires at the end of the 2020-2021 fiscal year. This renewal would continue the local option levy of \$0.20 per \$1000 of assessed value through the 2025-2026 fiscal year.

At the maximum rate, the levy will raise approximately \$2140 in 2021-2022, \$2204 in 2022-2023, \$2270 in 2023-2024, \$2338 in 2024-2025, and \$2408 in 2025-2026 for a total of \$11,360.

Explanatory Statement

Funds from this operating tax will be used for repair and maintenance of district roads with the intent of providing a similar level of service as has been provided in previous years. Without the operating levy, service levels will need to be reduced, primarily by reducing dust control.

If approved, the measure would authorize the district to continue to tax properties at a maximum of \$0.20 per \$1,000 of assessed value annually for five years in addition to the \$0.9301 per \$1,000 permanent rate tax limit. However, the district need not levy the full amount in any given year. The district governing body will determine the amount to levy each year after taking into account anticipated revenue and costs via the annual budget process.

Chinook Drive Road District Measure 2-128

Ballot Title

Caption: Request to Renew a Five-Year Operations Local Option Tax

Question: Do you want a five-year local option tax at \$0.85 per \$1,000 assessed value beginning 2021-2022 for road district operations? This measure renews the current local option tax.

Summary: The Chinook Drive Special Road District's existing local option tax will expire after fiscal year 2020-21. This measure will allow that tax to be renewed until 2025-26.

If the measure passes, the total tax for the road district would continue to be the permanent rate of \$0.9533 plus the local option of \$0.85 for a total of \$1.8033 per \$1,000 assessed value. This local option tax will first be assessed in November 2021 for the 2021-2022 fiscal year, and will last be assessed in November 2025 for the 2025-26 fiscal year.

The amount of money to be raised each fiscal year by the local option tax is \$24,570 in 2021-22, \$25,307 in 2022-23, \$26,066 in 2023-24, \$26,848 in 2024-25, and \$27,653 in 2025-26 for a total of \$130,444. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the assessor at the time of the estimate.

Explanatory Statement

The Chinook Drive Road District currently has a Local Option Tax of \$.85 per \$1,000 assessed value which expires at the end of fiscal year 2020-21. This measure requests the extension of the current Local Option Tax at the current rate for a five year period, from 2020-21 through 2025-26. The Local Option Tax revenues comprise approximately one-half of the Road District operating budget. Tax revenues are used for road maintenance and re-surfacing (grading, chipsealing, rock, emergency and surface spot repairs), snow removal, pothole repair, vegetation control, and minor drainage and land control improvements intended to extend road surface life and improve safety. With approximately five and a half miles of road to maintain, we will be unable to perform any road upgrades and will not be able to keep up with annual maintenance of the roads in their current state with the budget provided by the permanent rate alone.

Chinook Drive Road District Measure 2-128 Argument in Favor:

The Chinook Drive Road District consists of approximately 5 miles of roads. Over the past five years, we have been able to stabilize and hard-surface most of Chaparral Drive and begin a multi-year project to repair and re-surface Chinook Drive. We have also worked on widening and stabilizing Skipanon Drive. In addition, we have performed annual maintenance on the gravel roads, grading, ditching, repairing of culverts, vegetation control, and snow removal as needed. We have been working with the county to improve signage in the district and to improve traffic flow at the Chinook-Chaparral intersection. In the future, we are hoping to hard-surface Skipanon and finish surfacing Panorama to Fitton Green.

The Local Option Tax provides about half of our annual budget of approximately \$50,000. The permanent tax rate barely covers our annual maintenance and liability insurance. Without the Local Option Tax, we will be unable to perform any road upgrades and will not be able to keep up with annual maintenance of the roads in their current state.

At the June 2020 Budget Meeting, attendees unanimously approved renewing the Local Option Tax at the current rate.

We urge you to support this measure and continue the existing Local Option Tax at the current rate. Please vote YES!

Alsea School District 7J Measure 2-129

Ballot Title

Caption: Authorizes General Obligation Bonds for School Facility Improvements

Question: Shall Alsea School District No. 7J issue \$2,100,000 general obligation bonds for capital costs, facility improvements and receive \$1,740,000 grant? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

Summary: The District has been awarded a \$1,740,000 State grant which will be available only if the bonds are approved. If the bonds are not approved, the grant will go to another District.

If approved, this measure would finance capital costs of the District, including:

- Improving, constructing, equipping and furnishing classrooms, exterior gathering plaza, vocational shop, administrative offices, covered bus waiting area, community weight room expansion, locker rooms and restrooms, kitchen, lunchroom, and rooms for life skills, special education, culinary arts
- Security and safety improvements and additions including controlled entries, security system, and fire alarm
- HVAC, window, lighting, communications and technology improvements
- Replacing bus repair facility
- Improving track and grandstand
- Paying costs of issuance

Bonds would mature in 26 years or less from the date of issuance and may be issued in one or more series. If approved, the bond tax rate is estimated to be \$1.00 per \$1,000.00 of assessed value. Actual rates may vary based upon interest rates incurred and changes in assessed value.

Explanatory Statement

The Alsea School District 7J has placed a construction bond on the November 2020 ballot. If approved, this bond would provide funds to make capital improvements to District facilities.

Alsea School District 7J has been awarded a 1.745-million-dollar grant from the State of Oregon to use on identified projects if the bond measure is approved. If the bond measure is not approved, those grant funds would go to a different school district and will not be utilized for much needed facility and safety upgrades in Alsea.

Alsea School District 7J's Long Range Facilities Planning Committee, comprised of community members, parents, and staff reviewed data on the District's existing facilities, examined enrollment projections, discussed changes on how education is delivered and gathered input from the community to create a facilities improvement plan. If approved, the plan outlines bond funds be used to:

- Install Electronic Access Controls: at exterior doors to provide added safety and security
- Provide 2 new classrooms
- Demolish existing relocatable building and construct a new culinary arts, life skills and special education classroom
- Remodel and seismically upgrade the existing shop into a Serving Kitchen & Lunchroom.
- New VOC Shop Building Facility
- Construct a new Front Office Addition & Rear
 Vestibule addition & Office Expansion: secure entry,
 sick room, reception counter and additional offices.
- Build a new Bus Repair Facility: demolish old facility and replace with a new enclosed bay structure.
- Locker and toilet room remodeling and restoration
- Expand the Play Shed to include a new weight room that will also serve as an after-hours community use facility
- Electrical Service upgrade & new generator: Upsize and consolidate existing electrical services and provide emergency back-up generator.
- Fire alarm replacement to meet modern day occupancy safety standards
- New Heating & Cooling & Boiler Demolition: Provide HVAC mini splits at classroom space & new HVAC unit for gymnasium. Reclaim boiler room as instructional space.
- Replace school intercom and bell system
- Replace windows
- Construct a new "Graduation Plaza, and flagpole monument adjacent to Gym exits
- Provide needed grandstand repairs and crow's nest renovation.
- Construct a new covered bus waiting area.
- Track upgrade: Reconfigure the existing track in its current location to have (6) lanes and be regulation sized.
- Pay bond issuance costs.

What would the bond cost?

If approved, the incremental tax rate increase from the projected 2019 rate is estimated to be \$1.00 per \$1,000.00 of assessed value. Actual rates may vary based upon interest rates incurred and changes in assessed value.

The bonds would mature in 26 years or less from the date of issuance and may be issued in one or more series.

The District is a single campus facility serving 220 students for in person instruction. The District operates on approximately \$6 million in general fund budget, supported mainly through the State School Fund and local property tax revenue.






