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Dear Oregonian:

THIS IS VOLUME 2 OF A 2 VOLUME 1998 GENERAL ELECTION VOTERS' PAMPHLET. Earlier this month you should have received Volume 1, relating to statewide ballot measures. If you have not received Volume 1, please call the Oregon Elections Division at 503-986-1518.

Volume 2 of the Voters' Pamphlet contains the list of state measures and candidates, polling place locations, voting instructions, political party statements and the statements filed by individual candidates. For the first time since 1992, your edition of this General Election Voters' Pamphlet might also include ballot measures, measure arguments and candidate statements for counties and the Metropolitan Service District (Metro), and candidate statements for cities with a population greater than 50,000. In addition, local candidates and measures might also appear in optional local voters' pamphlets. Your county might have chosen to publish its County Voters' Pamphlet in combination with this volume. If so, it is inserted in the middle and contains your polling place locations and voting instructions. Some counties might mail a County Voters' Pamphlet separately and some counties might have decided not to publish and distribute a County Voters' Pamphlet.

By state law, all voters—except those receiving absentee ballots—should vote at their designated polling site between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. on November 3. If you vote by absentee ballot, please do not vote again at the polls, and make sure your absentee ballot is received by your county elections official by 8 p.m. November 3. If you are not sure where your polling site is located, see the list in this Voters' Pamphlet, check your newspaper, or contact your county elections office.

I urge you to vote on November 3—Oregon will be better for it.

Information

GENERAL

Your official 1998 General Election Voters' Pamphlet is divided into two separate volumes. This is a result of having 14 statewide measures on the ballot and 248 arguments filed in support of or in opposition to these measures. The amount of information to be included in the Voters' Pamphlet was too large to be bound into one book in a cost-effective manner.

This is Volume 2 and contains information on candidates only. You should have already received Volume 1, containing information on the statewide ballot measures. If you have not received Volume 1, please call the Oregon Elections Division at (503) 986-1518.

In this volume, partisan candidates appear before nonpartisan candidates. All space is purchased; statements and photographs are submitted by the candidates or their designated agents. The information required by law—pertaining to occupation, occupational background, educational background and prior governmental experience—has been certified by each candidate.

Miscellaneous voting aids, including district maps, precinct and polling place lists, voting instructions, and a complete list of state measures and candidates are also a part of Volume 2. If your county has chosen to produce a Voters' Pamphlet in combination with the state, the above listed voting aids will appear in your county Voters' Pamphlet. Another page, "Voting Accessibility for Elderly and Individuals with Physical Disabilities," contains information about provisions made for elderly or physically disabled voters.

The Voters' Pamphlet has been compiled by the Secretary of State since 1903, when Oregon became one of the first states to provide for the printing and distribution of such a publication. One copy of the Voters' Pamphlet is mailed to every household in the state. Additional copies are available at the State Capitol, local post offices, courthouses and all county election offices.

Remember, the 1998 General Election is a polling place election. Unless you have received an absentee ballot, plan to vote at your designated polling site between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. Designated polling sites are listed in this volume.

RANDOM ALPHABET

While the candidates' statements appear in alphabetical order by their last name in this Voters' Pamphlet, you will notice that they appear in a different order on your ballot.

Pursuant to ORS 254.155, the Secretary of State is required to complete a random order of the letters of the alphabet to determine the order in which the names of candidates appear on the ballot.

The alphabet for the 1998 General Election is:

VOLUNTARY EXPENDITURE LIMITS

Due to the passage of Measure 9 in the 1994 General Election, a candidate for statewide office (excluding judges) or the office of state Senator or state Representative may file to voluntarily limit their campaign expenditures. A candidate who chooses to do so files a "Voluntary Declaration of Limitation on Expenditures" with the Secretary of State.

Candidates running for statewide office, state Senator, or state Representative will have a disclaimer at the bottom of their statement. This statement indicates whether or not that candidate has voluntary limited their campaign expenditures.

The limits for these candidates for the 1998 General Election are as follows:

Governor	\$1,000,000
All Other Statewide Offices (except for judges)	\$400,000
State Senator	\$ 60,000
State Representative	\$ 40,000

WHAT IS SOCIALISM?

The Socialist Party of Oregon is dedicated to DEMOCRACY as a way of life. We believe in participatory political democracy and economic democracy. Socialists argue that "true" political democracy must be built on a foundation of economic democracy. In our society, where wealth is concentrated in the hands of a few corporate elites, democracy has not been realized. Even Aristotle knew that the basis of power is wealth and that great disparities in wealth would result in great disparities in political power.

Socialists are NOT COMMUNISTS! Socialists are critical of the Soviet experience and Communist China. Our commitment to democracy, with a focus on the empowerment of all workers, is the basis of our opposition to communism and corporate capitalism.

POSITIONS AND OPPOSITIONS:

- 1. Socialists believe that WORKERS SHOULD SHARE IN THE OWNERSHIP OF CAPITAL. There are over 200 businesses in the United States where workers either own or share in ownership/management. Job security and productivity will ultimately depend on empowering American workers. Worker pensions and government loans could be used as the basis of Employee Stock Ownership Plans. The key to these plans is to make sure that workers actually share in ownership/management. Living wages, full benefits, and full employment are goals of the Socialist Party of Oregon.
- 2. Political democracy is yet to be realized in the United States. Socialists believe that two developments would provide greater political representation for a larger number of constituencies: MULTIPLE PARTIES AND PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION. Are you frustrated by the lack of real choices offered by the Republicrats? Then support the development of third parties and support representation in our various legislative branches based on actual votes cast for each party. This would result in a more open public debate on the great issues of the nation and also result in a more representative political system. The political "strangle-hold" of the Republicrats is contrary to anyone's definition of democracy! The Socialist Party also supports the limitation and standardization of campaign financing.

- 3. Socialists believe in COMPREHENSIVE AND UNIVERSAL HEALTH CARE. Socialists oppose the profit-driven health care and insurance industry that dominates our current system. This system has made health care unaffordable to over 40 million Americans! This is a national tragedy and disgrace. Americans currently spend nearly a trillion dollars a year on health care in the United States. Experts agree that this amount would more than fund a NATIONAL SINGLE-PAYER SYSTEM that could provide comprehensive and universal health care benefits.
- 4. Socialists support the right of all Americans to a QUALITY EDUCATION in safe, well-equipped public schools that are staffed by fairly compensated professionals working closely with parents. We believe that our public school systems are inadequately and unequally funded. Funds for education should be increased using a progressive individual and corporate income tax. We are OPPOSED TO VOUCHERS because the result would be a public subsidy for wealthier families that can afford the total costs of exclusive private schools.
- 5. Housing is a serious problem for millions of Americans. We all know that real incomes have not kept pace with the incredible increases in the cost of housing, especially in Oregon and the Northwest. This "affordability gap" continues to grow making descent housing ever more problematic for many Americans. Socialists support a large-scale public investment in the DEVELOPMENT OF AFFORDABLE, HIGH-QUALITY HOUSING throughout the state. The formation of housing cooperatives, land trusts, and public housing programs that take advantage of "sweat equity" could dramatically increase the number of affordable homes. Major tax incentives should be used to encourage the development of quality "starter" homes and public grants could be provided for the improvement of existing low-income housing units. Socialists support the use of federal block grants for a new, major "affordable housing" program.
- 6. The present TAX SYSTEM in the United States is REGRES-SIVE, with the heaviest proportional tax burden on those citizens who can least afford to pay, the working and middle classes. These two classes pay on average just over 20% of their income in taxes. Rich Americans and corporations average about half this rate. The corporate share of total federal taxes fell from around 39% in 1960 to around 17% in 1990, and it continues to fall. In Oregon, for every dollar paid by corporations in excise and income taxes, individuals pay an average of \$9.35! The government has created a two-class tax system with the rich and corporations the clear winners. We support a federal and state tax overhaul that would result in a PROGRESSIVE tax system. Residential property taxes should be made progressive by using "circuit-breakers" such as household income and longevity in residence: lower household incomes and greater longevity would be used incrementally to lower property taxes. The goal is to create a progressive income and property tax system. Socialists are opposed to sales taxes because of their regressive structure. IT IS TIME TO END TAX BREAKS FOR THE RICH AND CORPORATIONS.

Are you a Libertarian? In the past few years, millions of Americans have heard the Libertarian message and stopped voting for the "lesser of two evils". Conservatives and Liberals alike, are finding that they can now vote FOR rather than against a candidate.

For decades, those who believed in social tolerance voted for Democrats. Those who were concerned with fiscal responsibility supported Republicans. Neither got what they wanted.

The Libertarian Party is the "Party of Principle". The ideals embodied in our platform haven't changed since its founding more than 25 years ago. In brief, Libertarians believe in social tolerance AND fiscal responsibility.

I believe that the men who signed the Declaration of Independence in 1776 were some of the most intelligent, fearless and honest men in history. They began the great experiment that put power in the hands of the governed for the first time. They understood human nature and planned a society based on the rights of common man. A government that was limited in its power allowed man to be truly free from harassment and tyranny.

Our limited government and free market system resulted in the highest standard of living ever! Millions of individuals, each pursuing a better life for themselves and their families, made America strong. Today however, an expanded federal government threatens our freedom and prosperity.

Republicans say they want smaller government. When they controlled the White House during the eighties, our budget deficits blossomed. They claimed that without control of Congress, they couldn't cut spending. Then in '94, they took control of Congress and this year passed the largest spending bill in the history of the nation.

I joined the Navy in 1979 and spent much of the next seven years overseas. After that, I moved to Tokyo where I worked for CNN and other networks as a news cameraman for nine years. When I returned, in 1995, I was shocked by the degree our government has infringed on our Bill of Rights, supposedly for our own good. Most Americans experienced the changes incrementally and many don't seem to realize the kind of all powerful government we are creating for our children.

When someone joins the Libertarian Party, they are asked to sign a simple statement; "I do not believe in or advocate the initiation of force as a means of achieving political or social goals."

We Libertarians believe that, in a free society, the government should be held to the same standard. George Washington once wrote; "Government is not reason, it is not eloquence, it is force. Like fire, it is a dangerous servant and a fearful master." Unfortunately, the "servant" has become "master" in our once great nation...and fearful it is! The federal government has proven itself to be a monster with an insatiable appetite for the property and God given rights of the people. We work five months in twelve to feed the beast and year after year it demands a higher percentage of the nation's wealth. Professional politicians must be stopped before we cross the line to tyranny!

Samuel Adams said; "If ever time should come when vain and aspiring men shall hold the highest seats of government, our country will stand in need of it's experienced patriots to prevent it's ruin." I think that time has come.

We have been remiss in our duty as citizens of a free society. We have not been vigilant while standing our watch. It's time to call the government to account!

What have they accomplished with such a huge portion of our wealth? Have they ended poverty? Have they stopped our children from using drugs? Have they protected our homes? Have they insured stable international relations? The answer to these questions is, of course, NO!

Since Johnson declared his "War on Poverty", the percentage of Americans living below poverty level has exploded.

Since Nixon's "War on Drugs" began in the sixties, drug use among our youth has grown steadily while the average starting age has declined.

PRINCIPLES and policies of the Natural Law Party will protect those ideals that Oregonians hold most dear. Costs will be cut, which will make it possible to fund important initiatives to improve the lives of all Americans.

The Natural Law Party stands for prevention of problems, conflictfree politics, and implementation of solutions to bring national life into harmony with natural law:

- Fund natural programs to prevent disease, promote health and cut health care costs by 50%. Results: save Medicare and Social Security: provide real health care to all.
- Implement educational curriculum innovations that develop students' inner creative genius and boost educational outcomes.
 Results: reduced violent tendencies, less demand for drugs, students realize their full potential.
- Adopt effective, field-tested crime prevention and rehabilitation programs to improve the quality of life for everyone. Results: reduce cost of law enforcement and cut back the massive prison population created by our failures.
- Promote sustainable agricultural practices to increase crop yields and profitability without chemical fertilizers and pesticides. Results: preserve the environment, family farms, our health and the quality of our food supply.
- Protect organic standards through a moratorium on genetically engineered foods. Result: no irreversible genetic disasters released upon an unsuspecting population.
- Promote energy conservation and renewable energy production. Results: reduce pollution and create national energy self-sufficiency.
- Balance the budget while cutting taxes responsibly and fairly through cost-effective solutions to America's problems—not by eliminating essential services. Result: prosperity now and for future generations.
- Eliminate government waste and special interest control of politics. Result: return ownership of our country to us.

Let's consider how some of these approaches will work.

HEALTH: American health care costs are spiraling out of control. The U.S. spends \$1 trillion annually on health care, but we have some of the worst health outcomes of any industrialized nation. We don't have a "health care" system; we have a "disease care" system. Our approach doesn't create healthy citizens; it only

sustains them after they've gotten sick. Only 1% of our health budget goes to prevention. Yet, according to estimates in *The New England Journal of Medicine*, 50% of deaths and 70% of diseases in this country are essentially self-inflicted—caused by an epidemic of unhealthy habits.

Proven, cost-effective prevention programs can cut health care costs in half, save the nation hundreds of billions of dollars annually and prevent untold human suffering. Such programs already exist, but Congress, lobbied heavily by those with a vested interest in the status quo, has largely ignored them.

CRIME: Another area where effective prevention programs could create enormous savings. Crime costs America about \$450 billion annually. We have 1.2 million citizens in prison and another 500,000 in local jails—6 to 10 times the incarceration rate of other industrialized nations.

Despite years of "get tough" policies, violent crime is still high. Violent offenders represented 50% of the rise in state prison populations between 1990 and 1996. One cost-effective crime prevention strategy would be to offer effective rehabilitation programs to these inmates, 90% of whom will be released from prison.

Example: a five-year Harvard study investigated the effects of the Transcendental Meditation technique in a maximum-security prison. Inmates who learned the practice experienced significantly decreased stress, aggression and mental disorders. Violence throughout the prison decreased, and the rate of return to prison among participating inmates was 30-35% less than in four other treatment groups.

The savings generated from such prevention-oriented programs could be reinvested in education, job training, environmental protection and other critical areas to safeguard the progress and prosperity of all our citizens.

EDUCATION: Reform is needed to develop the whole person. The Natural Law Party promotes educational programs proven to directly increase intelligence and creativity, moral reasoning, self-reliance, physical health and mental well being. America's most precious natural resource is the creative potential of our 260 million citizens. The Natural Law Party advocates educational, job training and apprenticeship programs that develop intelligence and creativity, bringing life into accord with natural law.

ENVIRONMENT: America needs to clean up pollution and protect natural resources. Our nation should lead the global effort to prevent the destruction of the earth's forests, the decimation of the diversity of species and potential damage from depletion of the ozone layer and global warming. However, I could not support initiatives that create economic destruction for thousands of Oregonians without offering viable alternative options. The revenues generated by our party's prevention-oriented approach to governing can support the transitions necessary to preserve both jobs and the environment.

Among political parties, only the Natural Law Party offers such a comprehensive approach to governance. I invite you to join me in this endeavor to bring national life into accord with natural law. Your vote for me and for other Natural Law Party candidates is a vote for a higher quality of life in Oregon and in America—on a realistic financial basis.

Maintain Our Quality of Life

Our tax dollars subsidize the desecration of our national forests. I will fight to preserve the quality of life for ourselves and for future generations.

Over 60 percent of Oregon's magnificent forests are federally owned. Properly managed, these native ecosystems could provide pristine drinking water, clean air, important medicinal plants and foods, jobs and recreation forever. Instead, the Federal government doles out over \$430 million tax dollars a year to large, private timber companies to build roads and clearcut the forests that belong to all of us. Mismanagement of our public lands causes landslides, pollutes drinking water, depresses property values, and wipes out our native fish runs. As Federal policy degrades our forests it sacrifices our quality of life - even future jobs in the fishing, timber and recreation industries all at a huge cost to taxpayers.

This is why I will work alongside both Republicans and Democrats to introduce a Senate version of the National Forest Protection and Restoration Act. This Act will provide training to dislocated timber workers, fund local governments, and restore our national forests so they may benefit us all forever. The Act now enjoys the bipartisan support of over 30 congressional representatives, but not the support of either Senator from Oregon.

Enact Real Campaign Finance Reform

A political system of "legal bribery" is selling out the public good to special interests. I will fight to restore accountability and integrity to the US Senate and power to the people.

Money, in the form of campaign contributions and lobbying, runs our political system. Over 80 percent of that money comes from corporations. As a result, politicians place corporate interests above the needs of tax paying and voting citizens. "Our" representatives eliminate hard-earned environmental protections and social programs that benefit the people while increasing senseless corporate welfare programs. No wonder so many Oregonians feel cut out of the decision-making process.

As your Senator, I will fight to end this system of legal bribery by supporting real campaign finance reform. I will work tirelessly for publicly-financed campaigns and to make TV and radio available to all candidates. After all, the airwaves do belong to the public. Voters deserve to hear the candidates with the best ideas, not just those with the big bucks.

Socialists wish to bring about fundamental changes in American society and in the workplace so we can increase the freedom people have over their daily lives. We believe we can accomplish this by changing our laws and institutions in ways that will expand the political, social, and economic equality that we need to make us free. We seek to make democracy a way of life rather than limiting it to the ballot box as the two major political parties wish.

WORKERS' RIGHTS

Socialists believe that democracy must be a fundamental part of the workplace and that all workers should participate fully in the management and operation of the firms in which they are employed. Congress should protect collective bargaining rights for all workers, including those in farm and service industries, should ban the importing of guest farm workers, and should support workers' rights of political expression. Congress should encourage more family wage jobs by refusing to subsidize the exporting of American jobs, by repealing GATT and NAFTA, and by increasing the hourly minimum wage to \$10.

POLITICAL REFORM

"We have the best Congress money can buy," Will Rogers, *The Autobiography of Will Rogers*, 1949. We Americans need to take back our government from special interests and their high-paid lobbyists by:

- 1) limiting private and PAC contributions to \$100;
- 2) instituting public funding of congressional campaigns;
- 3) banning private media advertising from campaigns;
- 4) amending the constitution for congressional term limits.

TAXATION

We need a more equitable and progressive federal tax system that eliminates loopholes for corporations and the wealthy while providing meaningful relief for persons of average incomes. We oppose gimmicks that create illusions of tax relief but which only protect the privileges of the few. Individuals should be able to deduct their Social Security and Medicare taxes from their federal income taxes.

HEALTH CARE

5TH DISTRICT

"HMO means Hand the Money Over," Michael Moore, *The Big One*, 1998. Americans believe in treating the sick with kindness and in leaving nothing undone to restore their health. As a people, we have sought to accomplish this through publicly funded medical schools, hospitals, research, and care for the elderly and poor. We increasingly find that our efforts are being undermined by the insatiable greed of the private health insurance industry and their profit-seeking HMO's. They deny people needed care, fail to insure millions of lower income people, refuse to pay for contraception, lower the take-home wages of workers and compromise the profits of small businesses. EDUCATION

We oppose privatizing efforts designed to undermine public education.

HUMAN RIGHTS

"If there is any fixed star in our constitutional constellation, it is that no official, high or petty, can prescribe what shall be orthodox in politics, nationalism, religion, or other matter of opinion," U.S. Supreme Court, 319 U.S. 624 (1943). Socialists believe in vigorous defense of our constitutional rights of free expression, privacy, reproductive choices, due process of law, and equal protection for all persons regardless of their social class, race, gender, age, sexual orientation, religion, disability, or immigrant status.

ENVIRONMENT

"Man is an imbalancer of nature mainly because he has always been battling nature," Jacques Cousteau, *The Sea in Danger*, 1975. Socialists believe that the same profit-seeking mechanisms that oppress people also destroy the environment. We all have a right to a safe and healthy environment, including clean air, clean water, open space, food and communities free from toxic chemicals, and to in all ways share in the common benefits of nature. Government policies and regulations should stop pollution before it happens, expand citizens' rights to information and involvement, ban clear-cutting, and guarantee protection for every citizen and community from the degrading of our environment.

- Taxes: There is a need for some level of taxation, in some form, to fund the necessary and legitimate functions of government. The federal income tax should be abolished, never to be replaced with any tax requiring citizens to report their income to the government.

Private enterprise should design new developments with a mix of housing and businesses to enable more people to commute via fuel-less forms of transportation.

- Asset forfeiture laws: Asset forfeiture laws, purportedly used to seize the ill-gotten assets of evildoers are, more often than not, used to seize property simply because it's there. These laws are blatantly unconstitutional in that they fly in the face of Fourth Amendment provisions against unreasonable search and seizure and Fifth Amendment provisions against the taking of private property without due process of law. Local and federal "law enforcement" officers can, and do, seize the property of innocent citizens without a charge ever being filed, often on the word of an anonymous "informant" or because a person "fits the profile" of certain types of criminal. The proceeds are often put to personal use by the seizing officer or agency. This is "legalized" theft.
- Welfare: Provide opportunity, not a handout. Nowhere in the Constitution is the federal government authorized to provide charity from the public treasury.
- Gun Control: The Gun Control Act of 1968 is virtually a translation of Hitler's gun control act of 1938. Why do we need Nazi laws in the United States? The ultimate goal of the anti-gun lunatic fringe is a total ban on the private possession of firearms. Their goal must never be realized! It's happened in Russia, Germany, China, Cambodia, and Tibet, to name a few. How many million people died as a result? To say it can't happen here is ludicrous, it's happening in Britain, Canada and Australia. The Second Amendment exists for the sole purpose of providing the citizenry with the wherewithal to resist tyranny. We are closer to becoming a police state now than at any time in our history.

Charter schools are public schools run by parents and teachers. They have virtual autonomy over faculty selection and curriculum. Under my plan, 80% of the money currently being spent on each child will follow that child into his or her charter school. The remaining 20% will remain in the traditional school system, increasing

per pupil expenditures without new taxes. Charter schools improve academic achievement in many states. They increase parental involvement and reduce crowding. Our school system needs to evolve. Oregon's children deserve the right to choose schools as diverse as they are.

TAXES

My proposed budget will allow us to lower income taxes by 40%. I also support completely eliminating property taxes, replacing lost revenue through a capped 5% consumption tax. A portion of the tax would go to the state, the rest would go to your local government, restoring local control. I oppose "sin taxes" which unfairly discriminate against the poor and socially unpopular groups.

• PERSONAL CHOICES

As an adult, you should be able to own yourself - it is the ultimate property right. I support Oregon's "Death with Dignity" law. I support a person's right to use marijuana for medicinal purposes. Though never desirable, access to abortion should remain safe and legal during the first two trimesters of pregnancy. I oppose mandatory seat belt and helmet laws for adults. I oppose government censorship of the internet and other media. No tax dollars should be used to subsidize personal choices or their ramifications.

· CRIME AND PRISONS

Most violent crimes, and the "need" for new prisons, can be traced to the black market for drugs. Drug trafficking has made our schools unsafe and plagued our streets with violence. Rather than regulating access to drugs, which creates black markets, we should put society in control by regulating their use. Breaking the black market will move drugs from the schoolyard to the pharmacy. It will dramatically reduce street crime. Our police will spend more time protecting our families and prison space will be freed to keep violent criminals behind bars. Our churches, communities and families will be free to fight drug abuse in a less violent setting. Those who take drugs must bear the responsibility for the harm they cause themselves. Ineffective drug laws help nobody and hurt society.

SOCIAL SECURITY

I will seek the federal waivers needed to implement the Oregon "Opt-Out" plan, endorsed by the 1997 Oregon legislature. Under the plan, funds from your paycheck normally sent to the Social Security Retirement Trust Fund become available for investment in a Personal Retirement Account (PRA). The "Opt-Out" plan ensures that current retirees will continue to receive benefits. It also allows those still in the workforce to take control of their future by investing in a system that provides true security.

HOW THINGS SHOULD BE Workers (including farmworkers) would be paid a LIVING wage of at least \$10 per hour with increases tied to the Consumer Price Index. Workers would be encouraged to organize through unions and works councils. Any form of intimidation would be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law

HOW THINGS ARE Oregon taxpayers subsidize corporations by allowing them to pollute and degrade our environment. If a land-slide wipes out a highway, our rivers are contaminated with chemicals or noxious fumes create air quality problems, you and I are expected to foot the clean-up bill, not the business that created the problem in the first place.

HOW THINGS SHOULD BE <u>Clearcutting would be banned on both public AND private land in Oregon</u>. Environmental standards would be strengthened and offending parties would be made to clean-up their own messes at their--not the public's--expense.

HOW THINGS ARE Across the nation over 40 million Americans have no health insurance. In Oregon, we only provide basic coverage to a portion of the poor. Working families are too often left to fend for themselves; only one health care crisis away from an economic catastrophe.

HOW THINGS SHOULD BE Quality health care would be a BASIC right of every Oregonian. Oregon would establish state-based, single-payer universal health insurance that will provide maximum flexibility.

HOW THINGS ARE Because of voter-approved property tax limitations and an income tax system which allows corporations to avoid paying their rightful share of taxes, far too many school districts are starved for funds. To deal with this shortage of funds, teachers must be laid off, programs must be cut or reduced and many student needs must go unmet.

HOW THINGS SHOULD BE <u>Under the Socialist Party's progressive tax system</u>, more money will be available for education. Teachers will be better trained and compensated, needed programs will be improved and expanded and students will have a better future because of a stronger educational foundation.

Yet recent research shows that 50% of deaths and 70% of disease in America are self-inflicted--caused by an epidemic of unhealthy habits, including improper diet, inadequate exercise, smoking, and alcohol abuse. Proven, effective, cost-effective preventive programs already exist and could cut our spiraling health care costs by 50%, but these programs have been largely ignored by government. Implementing such programs in Oregon could save billions of dollars annually--funds that could immediately be invested in other statewide and local initiatives to improve the quality of life.

Preventive approaches also apply to environmental issues. I live in Lincoln City on the coast of Oregon, and I adore this state with its beautiful ocean and mountains, its gorgeous seasons, and its clean, fresh air. To protect the environment, we must 1) implement sustainable agriculture to reduce the use of chemical pesticides and fertilizers, which pollute soil and groundwater and pose real threats to wildlife and human health; 2) reduce fossil fuel usage by developing alternative, sustainable energy sources that can stimulate the economy (e.g., cleaner air reduces the medical costs of respiratory disease); and 3) lead the global effort to prevent the destruction of the earth's forests, the decimation of the diversity of species, and the potential damage from ozone depletion and the greenhouse effect. But such initiatives will inevitably fail if they threaten the economic security of thousands of families without providing alternatives. Therefore, we also need to protect jobs and boost the economy through education to harness our greatest resource--the unlimited creativity of our citizens.

As a life-long educator, I feel that education should be for enlight-enment—the full development of mind, body, and behavior. The Natural Law Party promotes proven educational programs that directly increase intelligence and creativity and simultaneously improve moral reasoning, self-reliance, and mental and physical health. judges involved. By filling the courtrooms with angry and concerned citizens I have noticed a marked improvement in the behavior of judges and public officials in dealing with the citizens of this state.

I believe the primary reason for the corruption in our government is lack of accountability. Accordingly, as your Governor, I would make it a top priority of my administration to place the control of all public services under the supervision of the county commissioners in the respective counties. By so doing the public service agencies would be directly accountable to the commissioners and the commissioners would be directly accountable to the people. The different state agencies would be primarily involved in assuring that the county agencies are complying with state law in dealing with the citizens of Oregon. I promise the voters that if I am elected your Governor this November the corruption in our courts and state government will end the day I am sworn into office.

TOP PRIORITIES IF ELECTED GOVERNOR:

- 1. Repeal Senate Bill 100 (LCDC). Citizens have an absolute right to lawfully use their property as they see fit. Private lands cannot be taken for public use without just compensation.
- 2. Abolish SOSCF and return that function to the respective counties.
- 3. Create the Oregon Judicial Cornmission to oversee and discipline attorneys and judges. The Commission would be made up of 10 members (not-attorneys), two from each Congressional District.
- 4. Repeal the Scenic Gorge Act.
- 5. Abandon Outcome Based Education (goals 2000) and the Oregon Shine Benchmark Goals Program currently being used in our public schools.
- I endorse home schooling and a voucher system that allows parents the right to send their children to the school of their choice.
- 7. I favor the passage of the 2.5% Single Flat Tax (gross receipts tax) which would replace the state income tax, property tax and sales tax. The Single Flat Tax would guarantee funding of all essential public services.
- 8. Modify Measure 11 so that non-violent teenagers are not given long prison sentences for non-violent or victimless crimes.
- 9. Preserve the Savage Rapid Dam.
- 10. I will work for the passage of The Family Preservation Act. Under the act, children could not be permanently removed from the home of the biological parents without a jury finding of child abuse.

THE REFORM PARTY SUPPORTS:

- 1. Strict observance of the limitations placed on government by the Federal and State Constitutions.
- 2. Term limits-two terms in the Senate three in the House of Representatives.
- 3. Lobbying Reform- which would require that Elected and appointed public officials could not be allowed to lobby their former colleagues for five years after leaving office.
- 4. Withdrawal from encumbering treaties such as NAFTA and GATT..

BALLOT TITLE

PUBLIC SAFETY, HEALTH, AND SERVICE MAINTENANCE FIVE-YEAR SERIAL LEVY

QUESTION: To maintain current services, shall Benton County levy 35 cents per \$1,000 assessed valuation, outside permanent rate beginning in 1999-2000?

This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

The proposed levy will be in effect for five years.

SUMMARY: Passage of this levy will allow the county to continue to provide critical services.

Due to limitations imposed by statewide Ballot Measures 47 and 50, if this levy fails the county will be required to reduce current services by approximately \$1.0 million.

Two-thirds of the revenue generated from this levy will be used to maintain current services. One-third will be used to create and expand programs that address critical needs identified in recent studies, including:

- A Criminal Offender Control Program to reduce crimes committed by chronic adult and juvenile offenders;
- A team of social service and law enforcement specialists to reduce juvenile delinquency and child abuse;
- Expanded community policing to assist neighborhoods and rural communities in preventing and solving crimes and promoting public safety;
- Expanded alcohol and drug prevention and mental health services.

If the levy is not approved, essential county services will be reduced. Staff reductions will result in fewer services in public safety, public health, land-use planning, parks, and other county departments.

Levy cost estimate is 35 cents per \$1,000 assessed value per year. A home with \$150,000 of assessed value would pay an additional \$4.83 per month or \$53 per year as a result of this levy.

This levy, which maintains essential services and adds critical public health and safety services, is estimated to provide, \$1.57 million in 1999-2000, \$1.65 million in 2000-2001, \$1.73 million in 2001-2002, \$1.82 million in 2002-2003, and \$1.91 million in 2003-2004.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Local Impacts of Statewide Ballot Measures 47 and 50.

Measure 02-58 will allow continuation of county services that will otherwise be discontinued due to limitations imposed by Statewide Ballot Measures 47 and 50. It will also provide additional resources to improve public safety, reduce juvenile crime, and expand certain public health programs. Approximately two-thirds of the revenue generated from this measure will be used to maintain current services. One-third will be used to create and expand programs that address critical needs in public safety and public health that were identified in recent community studies.

Sixty-three percent of Benton County voters opposed Ballot

Measure 47, which narrowly passed statewide. If this local option levy fails, the county will have to make budget reductions of approximately \$1.0 million. This identical measure was approved by 60% of voters in the May, 1998 primary election. However, because voter turnout was less than 50%, the measure failed. Seventy percent of Benton County's General Fund operating budget goes to support personnel. Necessary staff reductions will result in fewer services in public safety, public health, juvenile crime prevention, land-use planning, parks, and other county departments.

Addressing Critical Community Needs

If approved, the levy will address critical needs and citizen concerns identified in several recent studies including: the 1996-97 City of Corvallis and Benton County United Way Community Needs Assessment; the Commission on Children and Families Comprehensive Plan, and the Benton County Juvenile Crime Prevention Plan. Approval of this levy will:

- Continue county services as provided before the passage of Statewide Ballot Measures 47 and 50;
- Create a multi-disciplinary team of social service and law enforcement specialists to collaborate with schools and the community to reduce juvenile delinquency and child abuse;
- Expand community-based law enforcement to help neighborhoods and rural communities quickly resolve public safety issues;
- Increase the number of adult and juvenile probation officers to reduce and control crime through improved supervision; intervention, treatment, and expanded partnerships within the community;
- Provide increased school-based health and drug and alcohol prevention services;
- Provide additional early intervention and prevention services to at-risk children.

Ensuring for the Continuation of Existing Services

County government's role is to ensure citizens receive core services that promote the best interests and well being of the community. These essential core services include:

- Monitoring, protecting, and promoting the health and wellbeing of Benton County residents in the areas of community health, mental health, and environmental health;
- · Law enforcement and corrections services;
- · Services for children and families:
- Juvenile crime prevention and supervision of juvenile offenders;
- · Management and operation of county roads;
- Management of public records and elections;
- Land use planning, Extension Service, parks, and fairgrounds.

The safety, security and well being of citizens is a fundamental concern of county government and is accomplished through cooperative partnerships with other agencies, organizations, and individual citizens. This measure will allow continuation of current services and improve public safety, reduce juvenile crime, and expand certain public health programs.

Benton County Measure 02-58 is **identical** to the levy approved by Benton County voters in May, but which was nullified by the state's "double majority" rule. The County is asking voters to **approve the same levy again** in November. The double majority rule will not apply in the November election, so voters can exercise local control.

THE LEVY IS CRITICALLY IMPORTANT FOR PUBLIC SAFETY. It restores 2 Sheriff's deputies and 1 deputy district attorney lost to budget cuts in 1997; it adds 4 new juvenile probation officers and 1 more Sheriff's deputy to work in new crime reduction programs:

- 1. The <u>Offender Control Program</u> targets chronic and juvenile offenders who are at increased risk of committing more crime while on probation. The county levy will be blended with state funds to provide tighter supervision and swifter sanctions for probation violators. The levy will provide four new juvenile probation officers and maintain Benton County's access to seven new juvenile detention cells. The State will fund an additional adult probation officer and continue funding for recently opened Day Reporting Center. The Offender Control probation officer will work in coordination with a school-based interdisciplinary team and with the Neighborhood Community Response teams.
- 2. The Neighborhood Community Response teams will expand community policing countywide to help neighborhoods and rural communities reduce crime and improve safety. The teams will include deputy sheriffs, police officers, prosecutors, adult and juvenile probation officers and citizens specially trained to build partnerships and solve problems. The levy will fund 3 deputy sheriffs and one deputy district attorney. The remaining team positions will be assigned from existing resources. The teams will support existing community policing efforts within the cities and expand community policing practices into rural Benton County.

We request your support for this levy.

BALLOT TITLE

CITY OF ALBANY, AUTHORIZING GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR STREET RECONSTRUCTION

QUESTION: Shall the City be authorized to issue General Obligation Bonds in an amount not exceeding \$9.85 million for street reconstruction? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of Section 11 or 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would provide funds to the City to finance the costs of capital construction and capital improvements, including, but not limited to:

Reconstruct the following streets:

Santiam Road - East of Main Street to Cleveland Street; 34th Avenue - Marion Street to Waverly Drive; Elm Street - Queen Avenue to Fifth Avenue; Salem Avenue - Waverley Drive to Albany/Millersburg city limits; and pay bond issuance costs

The bonds will mature in 20 years or less.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The Albany City Council is asking Albany voters to approve a \$9.85 million General Obligation Bond at the November election. The funds from that bond will be used for reconstruction of four streets. Those four streets include:

- 34th Avenue from Marion Street to Waverly Drive. In 1994, the portion of 34th Avenue between Marion Street and Pacific Boulevard was rebuilt; so this project would improve all of the rest of 34th Avenue.
- · Elm Street between Queen and Fifth Avenue.
- Santiam Road between the end of the couplet (completed by ODOT in 1998) and to 200 feet from Main Street.
- Salem Avenue between Waverly Drive and the Albany-Millersburg boundary.

All four of the streets are collector or arterial streets, meaning that they are major transportation routes through Albany. If the bond passes, it is estimated that the City would begin work on these streets in 1999 and that the last project would be completed in 2002.

General Obligation Bonds are paid for through property taxes. The estimated rate for repayment of the bonds is between 46 and 49 cents per thousand dollars of assessed value. In other words, the estimated average cost for someone who owns a \$100,000 home will be between \$46 and \$49 per year.

Albany's residents selected these four street projects. The City Council conducted a survey of Albany's residents earlier this year. In that survey, the Council asked residents about 16 different street projects. In the survey, 34th Avenue was most often selected as the street in Albany that most needed to be repaired. Elm Street, Santiam Road, and Salem Avenue were seen as the next highest priorities.

BALLOT TITLE

A MEASURE TO ALLOW SMOKING IN BARS

QUESTION: Shall the Corvallis Municipal Code be amended to allow smoking in bars?

SUMMARY: A measure to amend Corvallis Municipal Code Sections 5.03.080.160.02 and 5.03.080.160.05 2). This measure would amend the Municipal Code so that bars would be exempt from a prohibition against smoking in public places. The measure would also amend the Municipal Code so that bars would not become subject to City regulations restricting smoking.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The measure contained on the November 3, 1998 ballot is the result of an initiative petition drive.

The City Council, in August 1997, approved an ordinance regulating the distribution, sale, and consumption of tobacco within the City of Corvallis. The prohibition took effect January 1, 1998 except in bars and bar portions of restaurants which was effective July 1, 1998.

Two Corvallis residents filed a prospective petition for a local initiative "to allow smoking in bars" on November 24, 1997. A ballot title was developed based upon the information provided by the petitioners and the "notice of receipt of ballot title" was published in the Corvallis Gazette-Times. Following a request and hearing to review the ballot title, the Circuit Court Judge determined the wording for the ballot title was consistent with the petitioners' intent. The initiative petition was approved for circulation on December 15, 1997.

A total of 1,866 valid signatures was required to "perfect" (e.g., allow it to be placed on the ballot) the initiative petition. On July 27, 1998 Benton County Elections Division confirmed that, in the various signature sheet filings, at least 1,883 valid signatures had been gathered, thus allowing the ballot measure to proceed to a vote of the people.

The City Council received notice of the perfected initiative petition at its August 3, 1998 meeting. Council's choices were to adopt the provisions of the initiative or not adopt the provisions of the initiative and refer it to the voters. Council also had the option of referring a competing measure to the ballot and chose not do so. Council's position was to recognize that the initiated measure met State regulations regarding placement on the November 1998 ballot and the petition "to allow smoking in bars" was sent, by resolution, to a vote of the people.

If this measure passes, the current Municipal Code provisions relating to smoking in bars will be rescinded and smoking in bars will be allowed. If the measure fails, the current Municipal Code provisions prohibiting smoking within bars will remain in effect. A bar is defined as "an area which is devoted to the serving of alcoholic beverages for consumption by guests on premises and in which the serving of food is only incidental to the consumption of such beverages."

By law, all employees in our town are protected from the harmful effects of secondhand smoke in the workplace. Secondhand smoke kills bar workers. Workers in smoke-filled bars are exposed to tobacco smoke levels 4-6 times higher than in offices that allow smoking. That's equal to smoking 16 cigarettes in 8 hours. The death rate of bar workers due to heart disease and lung cancer is "50"-100% higher than for all other workers.

No workers should have to choose between their health and their jobs. That's why over 100 cities nationwide and the entire state of California now protect all employees from secondhand smoke in the workplace, including bars. And repeated studies have shown that smoke-free ordinances do not lower bars' long-term sales.

Ballot measure 02-65 is fatally flawed. It's written in such a way that it's unclear exactly what it means, or its significance for community health and fair treatment of all workers. Judge Gardner, in ruling on 02-65, said, "I think it detracts from the whole process if folks go in the voting booth and don't really know precisely what they are voting on and that would be my concern" (12/12/97 transcript).

ARGUMENT IN OPPOSITION

In 1992, the American Heart Association published a statement concluding that environmental tobacco smoke is a major preventable cause of cardiovascular disease and death. The statement urges that environmental tobacco smoke-often called secondhand smoke-be treated as an environmental toxin, and that ways be found to protect workers and the public from this health hazard. (This statement was published in the August 1992 issue of Circulation.) Employers should assess conditions that may result in worker exposure to passive smoke and take steps to reduce exposure to the lowest feasible concentration. The best method for controlling worker exposure is to eliminate tobacco use from the workplace.

Nicotine, the addictive drug contained in tobacco, leads to acute increases in heart rate and blood pressure. Cigarette smoke also increases blood clotting and damages the layer of cells that line all blood vessels, including the coronary arteries. In Oregon, it is estimated that 10% of the 7,000 annual tobacco-caused deaths result from exposure to secondhand smoke. The current local ordinance prohibiting smoking in bars and restaurants guarantees protection from secondhand smoke for both workers and the general public.

The Benton County volunteers of the American Heart Association urge our fellow residents to vote no on Ballot Measure 02-65.

ARGUMENT IN OPPOSITION

Corvallis is recognized as a leader among communities across Oregon for its commitment to protecting the health of the public and all food and beverage workers by ensuring that the air they breathe is free of noxious tobacco smoke. Now, outside interests are waging a high priced campaign to roll back the smoke-free workplace ordinance.

There is no question that secondhand smoke causes lung cancer, heart disease, and other health problems. In Oregon, MORE THAN TEN PERCENT of the 7,000 annual tobacco-caused deaths result from exposure to secondhand smoke (Oregon Statewide Tobacco Prevention Plan, November 1995).

Across the country, when local communities have taken steps to limit the effects of secondhand smoke, the tobacco industry and its allies have fought those efforts, using outside resources to change the terms of the debate and talk about issues other than health. Do not let it happen in Corvallis.

If passed, Measure 02-65 will deny bar employees the protection afforded other workers in Corvallis from the harmful effects of secondhand smoke. Workers throughout Corvallis are entitled to breath clean air on the job, whether they work in high tech, higher ed, health care, or the food and beverage industry. The ordinance ensures that and should not be changed.

Secondhand smoke is deadly. No amount of outside money or campaign expertise can change that simple fact. Workers throughout Corvallis are safer in their workplaces today than they were before the ordinance was enacted. A vote for Measure 02-65 is a step backwards. Passage of the measure would unfairly single out a particular group of workers and treat them differently.

As a local volunteer of the American Cancer Society I urge you to vote NO on Measure 02-65. People should not have to decide between a paycheck and their health.

BALLOT TITLE

WILLAMETTE RIVERBANK RESTORATION AND RIVERFRONT PARK GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND MEASURE

QUESTION: Shall the City Issue \$9.5 million of general obligation bonds to restore the Willamette Riverbank and improve Riverfront Commemorative Park?

If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI, of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: The \$9.5 million of bonds, plus up to \$3.6 million in grants and other funds, will finance improvements to the Willamette Riverbank and Riverfront Park consistent with City Council approved master plans. Riverbank restoration includes west bank Willamette River repairs from Western Boulevard through Van Buren Avenue, including repair of slide areas, re-vegetation, and providing riparian and aquatic habitat. The repairs will protect against future erosion and slides. The Riverfront Park design elements include the park corridor from Shawala Park to Tyler Avenue, a bicycle/pedestrian path, plazas, overlooks, information signage and artwork, park furnishings and amenities (such as benches, restrooms, and fountains), sidewalks, street improvements, surface parking, street furnishings and amenities (such as lighting, benches, and crosswalks) in the Riverfront and First Street area which includes parking and circulation improvements between First and Second Streets and on Western and "B" Avenue from Second to Fifth. The estimated maximum tax rate for the bonds is 31.47¢ per \$1,000 of assessed value. The taxes to repay this debt are exempt from Ballot Measures 5 and 50 limits.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The proposed bond issue will fund restoration of the Willamette Riverbank and improvements to the Riverfront Commemorative Park area. The west bank of the Willamette Riverbank along the Downtown area has experienced a number of slides and erosion areas during the last several years, particularly during the floods of 1996. The bank is receding approximately one foot every three years. This project stabilizes the riverbank to preserve the bank environment, including planned vegetation and aquatic habitat. It will also stabilize the high risk slide areas to protect the utility and transportation corridor and proposed Riverfront Park. This project is expected to control long-term operations and maintenance costs by decreasing slide events which have caused erosion and has required repairs to the bicycle/pedestrian path along the riverfront.

The Riverfront Commemorative Park project was developed following extensive public meetings which resulted in the adoption of the 1997 Riverfront Commemorative Park Master Plan. The project is designed to improve the park area and First Street. The Park improvements include a pedestrian and bicycle path, and incorporate plazas, river overlooks, benches, lighting, restrooms, fountains, information signage, and artwork into the Park area bounded by Shawala Park on the south and Tyler

Avenue on the north. First Street improvements, which go from B Avenue to Tyler Avenue will include parking, sidewalks, benches, improved pedestrian crossings including mid-block crossings, and lighting. Parking and traffic circulation improvements will also be made on Western and B Avenues from Second to Fifth Streets.

The total budget for the Riverbank Restoration and Riverfront Park projects is \$13.1 million. If the \$9.5 million bond issue is approved, it will be added to \$3.6 in other City monies, grants and assessments to provide full funding for both projects. The property tax portion of the project is projected to cost 31.47¢ per \$1,000 of assessed value in FY 99-00. This tax rate would result in a tax bill of approximately \$47.20 for the owner of a home assessed at \$150,000 in 1999. By the end of the 20 year debt repayment period, the tax rate is expected to drop to around 9.6¢ per thousand of assessed value for a tax bill close to \$14.50 for the owner of a \$150,000 home. Taxes levied to repay this debt will not be subject to the constitutional limitations adopted through the Measure 5 and 50 initiatives.

A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF THE SUMMIT CORPORATE PARK PROPERTY

QUESTION: Shall the 83 acre Summit Corporate Park industrial property, north of Reservoir Road and west of 53rd Street, be annexed to the City of Corvallis?

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 83 acres to the City of Corvallis. The property to be annexed is north of Reservoir Road and west of 53rd Street, is partially developed with an existing wood products mill, and lies entirely within Benton County. Upon annexation, the property would be zoned II, Intensive Industrial, with a PD, Planned Development overlay.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The 83-acre property proposed for annexation is located within the Corvallis Urban Growth Boundary, south of the Benton County Fairgrounds, west of 53rd Street, and north of Reservoir Road. Development for this area is required to be consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan which identifies the area as Intensive Industrial. This designation allows a range of industrial uses including manufacturing, processing, or assembling of unfinished or finished products from raw materials. The site would receive a district designation of Intensive Industrial with a Planned Development Overlay, PD (II), upon annexation. The Planned Development (PD) overlay requires public review of future development proposals.

The site has been used in the past as, and remains, a wood products production facility. The applicant has provided a 'General Land Use Plan" as required. The plan is advisory and is not binding. It identifies the continuance and possible expansion of Intensive Industrial uses on the site. It also proposes the relocation of Reservoir Road to facilitate safer and improved circulation in the area, the restoration of the Squaw Creek channel to close to its original location (currently the Creek has been diverted to ditches around the property perimeter), and a potential railroad line extension to provide direct service within the subject site. The General Land Use Plan is intended to help identify opportunities and issues associated with annexation, as well as visualize how a site could be developed. However, if the property is not annexed, development can still occur, consistent with the Benton County Industrial standards.

The eventual need to annex and develop this land was identified in 1980 when the City's Comprehensive Plan and Urban Growth Boundary were established. Consistent with City policies, on-site street and utility improvements will be the responsibility of the developer. Regulations also specify that developers will be responsible for off-site costs associated with street and utility improvements needed for this project. Costs for extra-capacity street and utility systems may be eligible for System Development Charge funding. Also, if adjacent properties are annexed, the respective property owners may be required to provide reimbursement for their fair share of these improvements upon development and/or intensification of their properties.

Impacts from increased development of the site include,

potential increased traffic volumes, potential realignment of Reservoir Road, and potential restoration of the Squaw Creek channel. Street and intersection improvements will be required with future development proposals to accommodate increased traffic impacts.

The City Council has found the annexation request to be consistent with the policies of the Comprehensive Plan and other City and State policies and standards. Citizens are encouraged to become informed about the annexation request. BALLOT TITLE

A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF THE MEADOWLARK PROPERTY

QUESTION: Shall the 5.37 acre Meadowlark property, south of SW Country Club Drive, between 45th and 49th Streets be annexed?

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 5.37 acres (5.31 acres of vacant land with 0.06 acres of County-owned right-of-way for SW Country Club Drive) to the City of Corvallis. The property to be annexed is south of Country Club Drive, between SW 45th and SW 49th Streets, and lies entirely within Benton County. Upon annexation, the property would be zoned RS-6, Low Density Residential.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The 5.37-acre property proposed for annexation is located within the Corvallis Urban Growth Boundary, south of Country Club Drive, west of 45th Street, and east of 49th Street. Development for this area is required to be consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan, which identifies the area as Low Density Residential (2-6 dwelling units per acre). The site would receive a Development District of RS-6 (Low Density Residential) upon annexation.

The City's Comprehensive Plan permits a range of 11 - 32 residential dwelling units for this site. A 31-lot Tentative Subdivision Plat has been approved, contingent upon annexation. The Tentative Subdivision Plat also acts as the applicant's "General Land Use Plan," a required element of annexation requests. The General Land Use Plan is intended to help identify opportunities and issues associated with annexation, as well as visualize how a site <u>could</u> be developed. If the property is not annexed, development can occur consistent with the Benton County Urban Residential - 5-acre minimum parcel size standards.

The Tentative Subdivision Plat approval illustrates a twophase single family residential subdivision that accesses from Country. Club Drive via a newly created 47th Street. Before the second phase of the project can proceed, a second access must be provided. The proposal also provides for some street and sidewalk improvements on the south side of Country Club Drive and a pedestrian/traffic calming facility to provide for a mid-block crossing from the south to Sunset Park.

The eventual need to annex and develop this land was identified in 1980 when the City's Comprehensive Plan and Urban Growth Boundary were established. Consistent with City policies, on-site street and utility improvements will be the responsibility of the developer. Regulations also specify that developers be responsible for off-site costs associated with street and utility improvements needed for this project. Costs for extra-capacity street and utility systems may be eligible for System Development Charge funding. Also, if adjacent properties are annexed, the respective property owners may be required to provide reimbursement for their fair share of these improvements upon development and/or intensification of their properties.

Impacts from eventual development include potential

increased population and increased traffic. Street/intersection improvements will be required with future development proposals to accommodate increased traffic impacts. The Corvallis School District has indicated that if residential development occurs, the increase in students could be accommodated within the existing schools in the area. Funds for future school development will be provided from property taxes collected throughout the 509J School District.

The properties in question: are contiguous to the existing City limits; five are receiving City water and/or sanitary sewer service; have received development approval or are already developed and have no pending plans for further development; and property owners have consented to have the property annexed.

Measure No. 02-66

BALLOT TITLE

PHILOMATH PARKS OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE FOUR YEAR SERIAL LEVY

QUESTION: Shall the City annually tax \$.16372/\$1,000 assessed valuation of real property for four years to provide additional parks maintenance funding?

STATEMENTS: This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent. This measure will last for four years.

SUMMARY: The annual collection of property taxes at the rate of \$.16372/\$1,000 assessed valuation will provide \$20,000 each year for four years to fund increased operation and maintenance activities associated with the adoption of the Parks Master Plan. The Philomath Parks Operation and Maintenance Serial Levy was a recommendation from the citizens Parks Master Plan Advisory Committee. The purpose of the levy is to supplement funding for existing park operations and maintenance as well as future parks to be developed under the Parks Master Plan. In addition to the requested levy, the Parks Master Plan Advisory Committee recommended that System Development Charges for new development be increased, and that the City commit to provide at least \$35,000 for parks operation and maintenance through its annual budget for each year that the levy is in effect. The taxes imposed by this serial option levy to fund the parks operation and maintenance activities are exempt from Ballot Measure 5 and 50 limits.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The City of Philomath recently adopted a Parks Master Plan and ten-year capital improvement program for development of a comprehensive city park system. The Parks Master Plan was the work of a citizen committee that included input from middle and high school-aged youth. Once implemented, this plan is intended to support the needs of both young and old citizens for the next ten years.

The Philomath Parks Operation and Maintenance Serial Levy was a recommendation to the City Council from the Parks Master Plan Advisory Committee. The purpose of the levy is to supplement funding for existing park operations and maintenance as well as future parks to be developed under the Parks Master Plan.

The ten year Park Capital Improvement Plan recommended by the citizen committee includes development of a permanent skateboard facility for area youth; restrooms and river access for Marys River park; development of smaller neighborhood parks within walking distance of residential areas for children and families; and the development of one larger community type park for more active recreation uses.

The levy would provide \$20,000 a year for each of the four years it would be in existence. Residential property with an assessed value of \$120,000 would pay an additional \$19.65 a year, or \$1.64 per month starting in 1999. Submitted by,

BALLOT TITLE

ALSEA SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 7J, GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND AUTHORIZATION

QUESTION: Shall the District be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not exceeding \$2,745,000? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: If approved, this measure provides funds to the District to finance the costs of capital construction and capital improvements, including, but not limited to, providing funds to:

- · Make site improvements to existing school facilities;
- Construct and furnish a 22,890 square foot gymnasium addition, including locker rooms, storage spaces, public restrooms, teaching stations for physical education and sports activities, a new media center, and a science classroom suite; and
- Pay bond issuance costs.

The Bonds will mature in 30 years or less.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Alsea District 7J is requesting approval of a general obligation bond for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a new addition to include the following:

- a 23,000 square foot gymnasium (to include locker rooms, storage spaces, restrooms, and teaching stations for physical education);
- · a library/media center;
- · a science classroom, laboratory, and storage area;
- · a new entrance with a receptionist's area;
- covered walkways for student movement from one area of the school facilities to another.

The existing gymnasium serves students K-12, which means that student athletes practice as early as 6:30 a.m. and as late as 9:00 p.m. The new gym would allow for more reasonable practice schedules and would also be a safer place for students to participate because walls and storage cabinets would not be close to the playing floor, as they are now. Furthermore, the proposed gym, with the playing floor on the same level as the floor in the existing school, would provide increased seating capacity for community members as well as a facility that could be used for a variety of community activities.

The current media center serves as both library and classroom; consequently, student access to computer stations and research materials is limited. The new media center would serve as the school library and a technology center with increased technological opportunities for both students and community members. The existing media center could be used as a much-needed regular classroom.

The existing science room lacks adequate ventilation and storage areas for chemicals and apparatus, making it hazardous to use and store certain chemicals. The current lab stations are also inadequate. The new science room, lab, and storage areas would meet code requirements and provide safer

classroom and laboratory spaces for students.

The new entrance with a receptionist's area would contribute to the overall safety of students by permitting increased awareness and monitoring of visitors in the building.

The opportunity for community use of the school resources would increase because of additional parking, a safe drop-off area, additional restrooms, and community access to the existing gym and stage as multi-purpose areas.

This action has been unanimously approved by the Board of Directors of the Alsea School District and the Alsea Citizen Facilities Advisory Committee.

The bond levy amount of \$2,745,000 will provide all of the improvements and additions described above. It is estimated there will be an initial cost of \$4.91 per \$1000 of assessed property value, with this tax rate declining somewhat over the 20-year bond repayment period.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Central School District #13J serves approximately 2700 students in two communities of Monmouth and Independence, and a large rural area surrounding the communities. The District encompasses approximately 150 square miles, principally in Polk County, with the boundaries including a small portion of Marion and Benton Counties. Central has an estimated population of 16,307 patrons. The District operates four elementary schools serving grades K-5; one middle school grades 6-8; one high school serving grades 9-12; an alternative school at Eola, and a teen parent education program.

The enrollment for the District has been increasing at an approximate rate of 1.5 to 2.0 % for each of the past ten years. The District has not constructed additional elementary, or middle school classrooms during this time; therefore, the major issue is "OVERCROWDING" of existing facilities. This condition was also identified by a scientific poll conducted in March of 1998. More than 60% of people polled in the District identified overcrowding as the major issue facing the district. The bond measure passed in May 1994 did not include a new school. These proposed bond funds will construct an intermediate school to accommodate the 5th and 6th grades of the District. The six grade class will transfer from Talmadge, leaving Talmadge as a 7th and 8th middle school of approximately 450 students which is what the school was designed to accommodate. To alleviate crowding at each of the four elementary schools the 5th grade classes will be transferred to the new school.

The proposed \$12,400,000 bond measure will:

- Construct and furnish a new district intermediate school in Monmouth;
- Build and furnish 4 additional classrooms at the high school, and acquire gymnasium bleachers, finish team rooms, and remodel physical education dressing rooms.
- Upgrade the heating and ventilating systems at Monmouth and Independence Elementary Schools:
- Upgrade playgrounds at Independence and Henry Hill Elementary Schools:
- Upgrade gym floors at Monmouth, Independence, and Henry Hill Elementary Schools:
- Remodel and improve student commons and make improvements to meet ADA requirements at Talmadge Middle School;
- Acquire and furnish modular classrooms and upgrade septic system at Oak Grove School:
- Remodel and improve the basement of Eola Alternative School; and
- · Pay issuance cost, and other bond costs.

The bond will mature in 20 years or less.

The estimated cost to property owners will be \$1.69 for each \$1,000 of assessed value. The District passed a bond measure in 1982 to remodel the high school was retired in 1996. The District also passed a bond measure in 1994 for \$11,765,000. The rate for each \$1,000 of assessed value is presently \$2.30 for each \$1,000 of assessed value. The combined measures will have an estimated cost of \$3.99 for each \$1,000 of assessed value.

QUESTION: Shall the District be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not exceeding \$1,350,000? If the bonds are approved they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: If approved, bond funds would be used to:

- Construct a new connecting road from Hoffman Road in Monmouth to 16th Street near Talmadge Middle School to give access to the new District School to be constructed in Monmouth. The proceeds will be used to pay for road improvements such as culverts or bridges, other than the road itself. The connecting road will meet all requirements for a city street in Monmouth, which includes sidewalks and lighting.
- · Pay issuance cost, and other bond costs.

The bonds will mature in 20 years or less.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Central School District #13J serves approximately 2700 students in the two communities of Monmouth and Independence, and a large rural area surrounding the communities. The District encompasses approximately 150 square miles, principally in Polk County, with the boundaries including a small portion of Marion and Benton Counties. Central has an estimated population of 16,307 patrons. The District operates four elementary schools serving K-5; one middle school grades 6-8; one high school serving 9-12; an alternative school at Eola, and a teen parent education program.

The District passed a bond measure of \$11,765,000 in May of 1994 which included a project to construct a road extending 16th street near Talmadge Middle School to Hoffman Road. The project included a bridge and a road approximately three tenths mile in length. In designing the bridge the engineers found that there were errors in the original flood plain plan. They could not proceed until this was resolved. It appeared that the flood plain plan would have to be changed which involved the Federal Emergency Management Agency called FEMA. It also appeared that this process would take as much as two years or more. On the basis of this information the District Board of Directors postponed this project until a later date and used the funds to develop needed technology in each of the schools during the 1996-97 fiscal year. During the 1997-98 fiscal year district administrators met with officials to determine what needed to be accomplished to resolve the flood plain problem. The administration has since learned that there are some alternatives that are available without correcting the flood plain planplan. Based on this new information the District Board of Directors decided to place this bond measure before the patrons of the District. The Board decided that the measure for the road should be separated from the measure for the new school.

The proposed \$1,350,000 bond measure will:

· Construct a new connecting road from Hoffman Road in

Monmouth to 16th Street near Talmadge Middle School to give access to the new district school to be constructed in Monmouth on land purchased from 1994 bond funds. The road and bridge will be approximately three tenths of a mile in length. The road will meet all requirements for a city street in Monmouth, which will include sidewalks and lighting. The road improvements may include culverts. The bridge will span Ash Creek and will connect 16th street to the new road.

· Pay issuance cost, and other bond costs

The bond will mature in 20 years or less.

The tax rate for this measure is estimated to be \$.23 for each \$1,000 of assessed value. If both measures on the ballot passes the total cost is estimated to be \$1.92 for each \$1,000 of assessed value.

QUESTION: Shall the District issue general obligation bonds in a principal amount of not more than \$8,240,000? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of Section 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: This measure, if approved, would authorize the District to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$8,240,000. Bond proceeds would be used to finance aquatic facilities, including improvements to the Osborne Aquatic Center and other costs of capital construction and improvements. The bonds would mature over a period of not to exceed fifteen years from their date of issuance.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Corvallis voters to consider pool project

Shall the District issue general obligation bonds in a principal amount of not more than \$8,240,000? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from property taxes that are not subject to Measure 5 or Measure 50 constitutional limitations.

The proposed bond measure would improve the Osborn Aquatic Center and provide money to build an outdoor community pool. The school district owns the pool, which it operates with the City of Corvallis.

For the last 19 years, the aquatic center has provided opportunities for children to learn to swim and develop athletically by participating on swim teams. Many adults exercise and maintain fitness. It also has classes for seniors, pregnant women and people who need specialized water therapy.

Money from the bond measure would fund these improvements to the center:

- A new roof.
- Pool resurfacing.
- · A new heating, ventilation and air conditioning system.
- · New family dressing rooms.
- Expanded men's and women's locker rooms and showers.
- · A community meeting room.
- Child care room, which would allow the center to offer this service.
- · A concession stand and other capital improvements.

Proceeds of the bond would also be used to build a new outdoor pool. After nearly 50 years of operation, the district closed the pool at Corvallis High School because it needed cost-prohibitive repairs.

The Corvallis City Council would decide where to site the outdoor swimming facility, which would include:

- · Interactive water toys such as fountains and sprayers.
- A lap pool.
- A large water slide.
- A wading area for families to play with younger children.

Unlike the Corvallis High Pool, the new outdoor facility would

be heated and open to the public between four and five months a year.

If the measure passes, property owners would pay an estimated average rate of 22 cents per \$1,000 of the assessed value of their property for approximately 15 years.

Swimming Is For Everyone

Only a few years ago, Corvallis had an outdoor public pool at Corvallis High School. Unfortunately, the Corvallis High pool deteriorated to a state beyond repair. Now Corvallis is the only city of its size in Oregon without a public outdoor pool. Swimming outdoors is a traditional, healthy, summer activity. Swimming in rivers and gravel pits is not necessarily a safe alternative. Our children, teens, adults, and families deserve attractive, safe, swimming environments, indoors and outdoors.

QUESTION: Shall Philomath School District be authorized to issue general obligation bonds not exceeding \$9,950,000 to expand and improve its facilities? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of Section 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: If approved, the measure provides funds to:

- meet increased enrollment demands with additional classrooms, acquire land and construct, equip and furnish a new elementary school for approximately 325 students:
- high school renovations to include replace the heating and ventilation system and windows, remodel locker rooms and restrooms to conform to handicap standards, address safety issues, renovate existing kitchen, regrade and expanding parking;
- middle school renovations to include construct and equip a covered, exterior physical education area and additional locker rooms and restrooms, replace science lab plumbing, expand and improve space for student services and expand parking;
- improve heating and insulation for community rooms at Blodgett and Kings Valley Schools; and
- provide safer bus pickup and delivery areas at District schools and correct drainage at high school and middle school athletic fields.

The bonds will mature over a period not exceeding 20 years from the date of issuance and may be issued in one or more series

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The proposed \$9.95 million general obligation bond is designed to meet enrollment demands, remedy overcrowding, address long term building improvements and assure positive environments for instruction.

The Philomath School District student enrollment has grown by 9.2% over the past 4 years. It is projected to grow by another 7.2% during the next two years. This growth will cause our already crowded middle and elementary schools to be beyond the capacity for which they were designed. The School Board and a group of community members have studied these developments carefully and have proposed to build an elementary school for grades K-1 on 19th Street. This will reduce the present elementary school population from grades K-4 to grades 2-5, while decreasing the middle school from grades 5-8 to grades 6-8. The new elementary school designs include the capacity to house 325 students and expand to 500 should that become necessary.

The Philomath High School was built in 1954, originally designed for 400 students. The building now has nearly 600 students in attendance on a daily basis. Some of the building components that have suffered over time; such as heating; windows, bathrooms and plumbing, are ready for replacement.

The entire high school and middle school campus requires an improved bus safety and traffic plan, which this projects addresses through routing bus traffic on the campus, rather than through the congestion of 19th and Applegate Streets.

The Philomath Middle School will undergo improvements to bathrooms, locker rooms, replacement plumbing and fixtures to the science lab and increase room for student services and counseling. It will also add a covered exterior area for physical education and recess on rainy days (similar to the elementary school).

Both Kings Valley and Blodgett Schools will have energy efficient heating and insulation added to their cafeteria/gymnasium/community rooms.

All of these improvements are meant to support the educational program. A recent survey of Philomath citizens revealed that 78% of the people rated the schools as excellent to pretty good, and only 1% said poor. The same survey cited 75% of our teachers as being excellent or good (18% were unsure). Of those surveyed 92% said our school enrollment would continue to grow. Recent test scores reveal that our students continue to perform above the statewide average, our high school dropout rate is half that of the rest of the state and 91.2% of our seniors graduate, with 60% going on to higher education.

It is the promise of more students, the potential of overcrowded classrooms by the year 2000, the desire for a continuation of the good schooling, improved learning and the sustaining of excellence which prompted the School Board to place the \$9.95 million dollars bond measure on the November 1998 ballot. None of the bond measure proceeds can be used for salaries or programs, only long-term capital improvements.





AMENDS CONSTITUTION: AUTHORIZES STATE TO GUARANTEE BONDED INDEBTEDNESS OF CERTAIN EDUCATION DISTRICTS

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote authorizes state to guarantee general obligation bonds issued by certain education districts.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains prohibition against state guarantee of general obligation bonds issued by education districts.

SUMMARY: Constitution now generally prohibits state from creating debt over \$50,000 or lending its credit. Measure amends constitution permitting state to guarantee general obligation bonded indebtedness of school districts, education service districts, community college districts. Limits amount state can guarantee to 1/2 of one percent of true cash value of taxable property in state. State may issue bonds, borrow from Common School Fund to satisfy obligation. ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: Reduced interest and issuance costs on indebtedness by participating school districts, education service districts and community college districts are estimated to be \$70 million over the next 20 years under this measure. This estimate is based on current levels of bond issuance. There is no financial effect on state government revenues or expenditures

55 **AMENDS CONSTITUTION: PERMITS** STATE TO GUARANTEE EARNINGS ON PREPAID TUITION TRUST FUND

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: Vote "Yes" to authorize state to quarantee earnings under tuition trust fund program.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: Vote "No" to refuse authorization to guarantee earnings under tuition trust fund program.

SUMMARY: Amends Constitution. Measure approval makes effective the Post-secondary Education Expense Program adopted by 1997 Legislature Program allows payment of undergraduate tuition before enrollment at lower than highest prevailing rate at time of enrollment; establishes trust fund. Measure permits state to exceed constitutional debt limit to authorize indebtedness at 1/2 of one percent of true cash value of all property in state to guarantee minimum benefits on contributions to prepaid tuition trust fund. State may issue bonds; may borrow from Common School Fund, if necessarv

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: It is estimated that this measure will require approximately \$1,200,000 in total start up costs, in state funds, over the first four years of its operation.

EXPANDS NOTICE TO LANDOWNERS REGARDING CHANGES TO LAND USE LAWS

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote requires governments to mail notice to landowners regarding changes to land use laws.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains current notice requirements, which do not require mailed notice to landowners.

SUMMARY: Requires counties and cities to mail notices to landowners regarding changes to state, local, or metropolitan service district land use laws and regulations that limit or prohibit uses currently allowed on the landowners' property. Requires state government to reimburse counties and cities for costs of mailing notice resulting from changes to state statutes or administrative rules. Requires metropolitan service districts to reimburse counties and cities for costs of mailing notice resulting from changes in district land use regulations. Prescribes form of each notice.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: State government expenditures are estimated to be \$2,040,000 annually in notice costs. Local government expenditures, including those of the Metropolitan Service District, are estimated to be \$1,547,000 a year.

This estimate is based on 7,000 land use actions per year, of which 3,900 would require some notice under this measure. Actual expenditures may vary based on such variables as the total number of land use actions, the number of actions included in each notice and the costs per notice.

57 MAKES POSSESSION OF LIMITED AMOUNT OF MARIJUANA CLASS C MISDEMEANOR

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote makes possession of less than one ounce of marijuana a Class C misdemeanor.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains statute making possession of less than one ounce of marijuana a violation.

SUMMARY: Under current Oregon law, possession of less than one ounce of marijuana is a violation, punishable by 500 to 1000 dollar fine; charges against first-time offenders may be dismissed upon completion of marijuana diversion agreement. Measure makes possession of less than one ounce of marijuana a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by up to 30 days imprisonment, plus 500 to 1000 dollar fine. Measure also makes failure to complete diversion agreement ground for six-month suspension of offender's driving privileges. Allocates \$600,000 for enforcement.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: Direct state expenditures for law enforcement, indigent defense, court operation, and jury payments are estimated at \$586,000 annually. A one-time cost of \$50,000 would be required for Driver and Motor Vehicle Services computer programming. State expenditures could increase or decrease depending on the number of cases prosecuted, the number of individuals entering diversion agreements, and the number of defendants eligible for court-appointed counsel.

Direct county expenditures for local jail beds are estimated at \$229,000 annually. Local expenditures could increase or decrease depending on the length of sentences imposed by the courts, population management decisions of jail commanders, and management of offenders on probation or post-release supervision.

State fine revenues are estimated to be reduced by \$638,000 annually.

Major assumptions for these estimates include:

- 6,000 arrests per year.
- 50 percent of arrests will be prosecuted as misdemeanors, 40 percent will be prosecuted as violations, and 10 percent will result in a diversion agreement.
- 50 percent of all arrests will result in an average of one day of county jail time.
- 54 percent of arrests prosecuted as violations and 40 percent of arrests prosecuted as misdemeanors will result in convictions.
- The minimum fine of \$500 will be assessed for all misdemeanor convictions and maximum fine of \$250 will be assessed for all violations convictions.
- 40 percent of fines assessed for misdemeanor convictions and 78 percent of fines assessed for violation convictions will be collected.

PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

58 REQUIRES ISSUING COPY OF ORIGINAL OREGON BIRTH CERTIFICATE TO ADOPTEES

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote requires issuing copy of original Oregon birth certificate to adult adoptees upon request.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains confidentiality of original Oregon birth certificate of adoptees unless court orders disclosure.

SUMMARY: Current Oregon law provides that upon decree of adoption, a new birth certificate generally will be substituted for the original birth certificate, and the original certificate showing birth parent information will not be subject to inspection, unless a court orders disclosure. Measure would require state registrar to issue certified copy of original birth certificate to any Oregon born adopted person 21 years old or older. Establishes same procedures, filing fees and waiting periods for obtaining birth certificate copies for adopted persons as for non-adopted persons.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: No financial effect on state or local government expenditures or revenues.

59 AMENDS CONSTITUTION: PROHIBITS USING PUBLIC RESOURCES TO COLLECT MONEY FOR POLITICAL PURPOSES

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote prohibits using public resources to collect or help collect political funds.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote rejects prohibition on using public resources to collect or help collect political funds.

SUMMARY: Amends constitution. Prohibits using "public funds" to collect or assist in collecting "political funds." "Public funds" defined to include public employee time, public property or equipment and supplies. "Political funds" defined to include any expenditure supporting or opposing a candidate, ballot measure or initiative petition. Prohibition applies even if public entities are reimbursed for use of public funds for collection. Measure would prohibit public employee payroll deduction for any entity that uses any funds deducted for political purposes or that commingles political and non-political funds.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: This measure is estimated to reduce state expenditures for voters' pamphlet publication by \$1,800,000 in the year 2000 and in subsequent even-numbered years. State revenues from filing fees are estimated to decrease by \$400,000 in the year 2000 and in subsequent even-numbered years.

These reductions result from eliminating candidates' statements and measure arguments in the State Voters' Pamphlet.

The measure will have no financial effect on local government expenditures or revenues.

60 REQUIRES VOTE BY MAIL IN BIENNIAL PRIMARY, GENERAL ELECTIONS

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote amends existing law to require vote by mail in biennial primary, general elections.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains current law prohibiting vote by mail in biennial primary or general elections.

SUMMARY: Current law prohibits vote by mail for biennial primary or general elections. This proposal eliminates the prohibition and requires vote by mail for biennial primary or general elections. The proposal does not affect existing law permitting the Secretary of State and county clerk to conduct other elections either at the polls or by mail.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: County government expenditures are estimated to be reduced each Primary and General Election year by \$3,021,709.

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61 CHANGES MINIMUM SENTENCES FOR LISTED CRIMES, INCLUDING CERTAIN REPEAT OFFENSES

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote changes minimum sentences for listed crimes, including certain repeat offenses.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains present sentencing statutes and guidelines for listed crimes, including repeat offenses.

SUMMARY: Establishes minimum sentences for crimes listed as "major crimes." Provides one to three year proportionally increased sentences for major crimes, aggravated murder or murder if person has one to three prior convictions for major crime within past 10 years. Prior juvenile court adjudications involving major crimes apply to increase sentence. Treats prior conviction for driving under influence of intoxicants as major crime if current conviction is for crimially negligent homicide using vehicle. Prohibits temporary leave or other reduction in additional prison time imposed under measure.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: The mandatory and presumptive sentences imposed under this measure are estimated to require 4,300 new prison beds by 2006, with direct state expenditures for prison construction and start-up of \$470 million by 2006.

Direct state expenditures for prison operating costs and debt service are estimated at \$21 million in 1999-2000 and \$40 million in 2000-2001, growing to \$125 million in 2005-2006. Community corrections payments from the state to counties for probation and post-prison supervision are estimated to be reduced by \$800,000 in 1999-2000, \$1.9 million in 2000-2001, and \$1.4 million in 2005-2006.

Under this measure, direct state expenditures for court operations are estimated at \$100,000 in 1998-1999 and \$175,000 in each of the next two years. State expenditures for indigent defense are estimated at \$350,000 in 1998-1999 and \$900,000 in each of the next two years.

Major factors affecting this estimate include:

- Plea bargaining practices of prosecuting attorneys;
- Prior criminal history of offenders;
- Sentencing practices of judges;
- Numbers of arrests; and
- Type of prison bed, minimum or medium security.

62 AMENDS CONSTITUTION: REQUIRES CAMPAIGN FINANCE DISCLOSURES; REGULATES SIGNATURE GATHERING; GUARANTEES CONTRIBUTION MFTHODS

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote requires additional campaign finance disclosures; regulates signature gathering; guarantees certain contribution methods.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote rejects requiring additional campaign finance disclosures, regulating signature gathering, guaranteeing certain contribution methods.

SUMMARY: Amends constitution. Existing statutes require disclosing certain campaign finances. Measure adds constitutional requirements for prompter disclosure of contributions \$500 or more; more frequent disclosure of contributions/expenditures for referendum/initiative petitions. Requires disclosing entity authorizing/paying for political advertising. Legislature may regulate, prohibit paying signature gatherers if it finds practice has caused fraud, other abuses. Guarantees individuals' right to make campaign contributions using certain methods. Secretary of State must promptly publish finance reports. Prohibits payments for signing/not signing petitions. Specifies penalties. Other provisions.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: This measure is estimated to increase state expenditures by \$248,000 a year, with an additional one-time-only start up cost to the state of \$104,000. Expenditures by county and city elections filing officers cannot be calculated, due to insufficient data.

63 AMENDS CONSTITUTION: MEASURES PROPOSING SUPERMAJORITY VOTING REQUIREMENTS REQUIRE SAME SUPERMAJORITY FOR PASSAGE

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote allows passage of greater-than-majority voting requirements only by equally large majority.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote allows simple majority to pass measures that impose greater-than-majority voting requirements.

SUMMARY: Amends constitution. Measures including a requirement for more than a majority of votes cast by the electorate to approve any change in law or government action would become effective only if approved by at least the same percentage of voters specified in that proposed voting requirement. For example, a measure imposing a 2/3 majority voting requirement to change law would require a 2/3 majority to pass. Applies to initiated, referred measures presented to voters on or after November 3, 1998, including measures on same ballot.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: No financial effect on state or local government expenditures or revenues.

64 PROHIBITS MANY PRESENT TIMBER HARVEST PRACTICES, IMPOSES MORE RESTRICTIVE REGULATIONS

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote adopts restrictions on timber harvest practices, including federal regulation, allows citizen-suit enforcement.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains current regulations concerning timber harvest practices.

SUMMARY: Prohibits many present timber harvest practices, chemical herbicides, pesticides in forest. Limits size of trees that can be harvested. Covers private, state, federal forestlands. Imposes new harvest regulations including federal regulation by classifying forestland waters as "navigable." State Board of Forestry must adopt rew timber harvest methods and regulations to meet new requirements. Requires state to submit new forestland water quality plan to federal Environmental Protection Agency, seek approval before permitting logging. Authorizes citizens suits to enforce new harvest restrictions or other provisions of measure.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: State revenues are estimated to decrease \$25,000,000 per year. This estimate assumes a 60% harvest reduction in western Oregon and a 65% harvest reduction in eastern Oregon. These estimated decreases apply to private, local and state lands.

Current state expenditures are estimated to decrease by \$25,000,000 because of the revenue loss. Major annual state expenditure reductions would occur in forest management, fire protection, and regulation, timber tax revenue and administration, and Common School Fund forest land management.

Also, added regulations required by this measure would increase the need for ongoing state government expenditures above current requirements by \$5,000,000 per year. One-time state expenditures of \$1,400,000 would be required.

Revenues to schools are estimated to decrease by \$33.200,000 a year. County and special district revenues are estimated to decrease by \$7,800.000 per year.

Revenues that contribute to the Common School Fund will be reduced by \$8,700,000 primarily due to an estimated 84% decrease in harvest on Common School Fund Trust lands. This, in turn, will mean reduced earnings on the Common School Fund principal for distribution to schools.

65 AMENDS CONSTITUTION: CREATES PROCESS FOR REQUIRING LEGISLATURE TO REVIEW ADMINISTRATIVE RULES

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote creates process for petitioning legislature to require its review of administrative rules.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote keeps system not requiring legislative approval for administrative rules to remain in effect.

SUMMARY: Amends constitution. Current law does not require legislative review of administrative rules. Measure allows voters to require legislative review of administrative rules at next regular session when petition, signed by specified number of voters, is filed listing affected rules. Rule remains effective until reviewed by legislature, but rule ceases to be in effect unless approved. If governor vetoes bill, rule is disapproved unless legislature overrides veto. If rule is not approved, state agency may adopt new rule on same issue, but legislative review is required.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: No financial effect on state or local government expenditures or revenues.

66 AMENDS CONSTITUTION: DEDICATES SOME LOTTERY FUNDING TO PARKS, BEACHES; HABITAT, WATERSHED PROTECTION

RESULT OF "YES" VDTE: "Yes" vote dedicates 15 percent lottery funding to parks, beaches; salmon, wildlife habitat, watershed protection.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains system restricting state lottery funding to job creation, economic development, public education.

SUMMARY: Amends constitution. State lottery proceeds currently limited to job creation, economic development, public education. Measure dedicates 15 percent of net lottery proceeds to new fund for parks, beaches; salmon, wildlife habitat, watershed protection. Dedicates half of fund to create, maintain state parks, ocean shores, public beach access areas, historic sites, recreation areas. Dedicates other half for single agency to administer funds to protect native salmon, wildlife habitat, watersheds, using at least 65 percent for capital expenditures. Requires biennial audits, voter renewal in 2014. Other provisions.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: An estimated \$46.2 million of state lottery proceeds will be directed each year to parks and natural resources until the year 2014, when there is an automatic revote. Currently the Oregon legislature allocates those funds to a variety of programs including, but not limited to, education, economic and community development, natural resources and transportation. This estimate is based on 1999-2001 projections of lottery proceeds.

67 ALLOWS MEDICAL USE OF MARIJUANA WITHIN LIMITS; ESTABLISHES PERMIT SYSTEM

RESULT OF "YES" VOTE: "Yes" vote allows medical use of marijuana within specified limits: establishes state-controlled permit system.

RESULT OF "NO" VOTE: "No" vote retains Oregon criminal, civil forfeiture laws prohibiting possession, delivery and production of marijuana.

SUMMARY: Oregon statutes currently prohibit possession, delivery, production of marijuana. Measure allows engaging in, assisting medical use of marijuana, within specified limits.

Requires medical use be necessary to mitigate symptoms, effects of debilitating medical condition, including cancer, glaucoma, AIDS, HIV, multiple sclerosis, others. Establishes state permit system requiring physician's written proof. Within specified limitations, exempts permit holder or applicant from marijuana criminal statutes; authorizes criminal charge defense for medical use without permit.

Limits amounts of usable marijuana, number of plants that may be possessed. Other provisions.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL IMPACT: Direct annual state expenditures are estimated at \$147,000, based on the assumption that 500 applicants will register with the Oregon Health Division per year. Some or all of these costs may be offset by fees to be established by the Health Division as provided in the measure.

BENTON COUNTY

02-58 PUBLIC SAFETY, HEALTH, AND SERVICE MAINTENANCE FIVE-YEAR SERIAL LEVY

QUESTION: To maintain current services, shall Benton County levy 35 cents per \$1,000 assessed valuation, outside permanent rate beginning in 1999-2000?

This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

The proposed levy will be in effect for five years.

SUMMARY: Passage of this levy will allow the county to continue to provide critical services.

Due to limitations imposed by statewide Ballot Measures 47 and 50, if this levy fails the county will be required to reduce current services by approximately \$1.0 million.

Two-thirds of the revenue generated from this levy will be used to maintain current services. One-third will be used to create and expand programs that address critical needs identified in recent studies, including:

- A Criminal Offender Control Program to reduce crimes committed by chronic adult and juvenile offenders;
- A team of social service and law enforcement specialists to reduce juvenile delinquency and child abuse;
- Expanded community policing to assist neighborhoods and rural communities in preventing and solving crimes and promoting public safety;
- Expanded alcohol and drug prevention and mental health services.

If the levy is not approved, essential county services will be reduced. Staff reductions will result in fewer services in public safety, public health, land-use planning, parks, and other county departments.

Levy cost estimate is 35 cents per \$1,000 assessed value per year. A home with \$150,000 of assessed value would pay an additional \$4.38 per month or \$53 per year as a result of this levy.

This levy, which maintains essential services and adds critical public health and safety services, is estimated to provide, \$1.57 million in 1999-2000, \$1.65 million in 2000-2001, \$1.73 million in 2001-2002, \$1.82 million in 2002-2003, and \$1.91 million in 2003-2004.

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 4.79 acres to the City of Albany. The property to be annexed is south of Queen Avenue SW and north of 27th Avenue SW. Upon annexation, the property would be zoned RS-6.5 (Single Family Residential).

22-66 A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF PROPERTY ADJOINING GOLDFISH FARM ROAD.

QUESTION: Shall the 4.91-acre property adjoining Goldfish Farm Road be annexed?

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 4.91 acres to the City of Albany. The property to be annexed is north of Santiam Highway SE and south of Knox Butte Road SE. Upon annexation, the property would be zoned CC (Community Commercial).

22-70 CITY OF ALBANY, AUTHORIZING GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR STREET RECONSTRUCTION.

QUESTION: Shall the City be authorized to issue General Obligation Bonds in an amount not exceeding \$9.85 million for street reconstruction? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of Section 11 or 11b, Article XI of Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would provide funds to the City to finance the costs of capital construction and capital improvements, including, but not limited to:

Reconstruct the following streets:

Santiam Road - East of Main Street to Cleveland Street:

34th Avenue - Marion Street to Waverly Drive; Elm Street - Queen Avenue to FifthAvenue;

Salem Avenue - Waverly Drive to Albany/ Millersburg city limits; and

Pay bond issuance costs.

The bonds will mature in 20 years or less.

CITY OF CORVALLIS

02-65 A MEASURE TO ALLOW SMOKING IN BARS

QUESTION: Shall the Corvallis Municipal Code be amended to allow smoking in bars?

SUMMARY: A measure to amend Corvallis Municipal Code Sections 5.03.080.160.02 and 5.03.080.160.05 2). This measure would amend the Municipal Code so that bars would be exempt from a prohibition against smoking in public places. The measure would also amend the Municipal Code so that bars would not become subject to City regulations restricting smoking.

02-68 WILLAMETTE RIVERBANK RESTORA-TION AND RIVERFRONT PARK GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND MEASURE

QUESTION: Shall the City issue \$9.5 million of general obligation bonds to restore the Willamette Riverbank and improve Riverfront Commemorative Park?

If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI, of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: The \$9.5 million of bonds, plus up to \$3.6 million in grants and other funds, will finance improvements to the Willamette Riverbank and Riverfront Park consistent with City Council approved master plans. Riverbank restoration includes west bank Willamette River repairs from Western Boulevard through Van Buren Avenue, including repair of slide areas, re-vegetation, and providing riparian and aquatic habitat. The repairs will protect against future erosion and slides. The Riverfront Park design elements include the park corridor from Shawala Park to Tyler Avenue, a bicycle/pedestrian path, plazas, overlooks, information signage and artwork, park furnishings and amenities (such as benches, restrooms, and fountains), sidewalks, street improvements, surface parking, street furnishings and amenities (such as lighting, benches, and crosswalks) in the Riverfront and First Street area which includes parking and cir-culation improvements between First and Second Streets and on Western and "B" Avenue from Second to Fifth. The estimated maximum tax rate for the bonds is 31.47¢ per \$1,000 of assessed value. The taxes to repay this debt are exempt from Ballot Measures 5 and 50 limits.

02-69 A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF THE SUMMIT CORPORATE PARK PROPERTY

QUESTION: Shall the 83 acre Summit Corporate Park industrial property, north of Reservoir Road and west of 53rd Street, be annexed to the City of Corvallis?

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 83 acres to the City of Corvallis. The property to be annexed is north of Reservoir Road and west of 53rd Street, is partially developed with an existing wood products mill. and lies entirely within Benton County, Upon annexation, the property would be zoned II, Intensive Industrial, with a PD, Planned Development overlay.

02-70 A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF THE MEADOWLARK PROPERTY

QUESTION: Shall the 5.37 acre Meadowlark property, south of SW Country Club Drive, between 45th and 49th Streets be annexed?

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 5.37 acres (5.31 acres of vacant land with 0.06 acres of County-owned right-of-way for SW Country Club Drive) to the City of Corvallis. The property to be annexed is south of Country Club Drive, between SW 45th and SW 49th Streets, and lies entirely within Benton County. Upon annexation, the property would be zoned RS-6, Low Density Residential.

02-59 A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF 554 NORTH 9TH STREET

QUESTION: Shall 554 North 9th Street, 2.00 acres located north of Pioneer Street and west of North 9th Street, be annexed?

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 2.00 acres of land zoned Low Density Residential to the City of Philomath. The property to be annexed is generally north of Pioneer Street and west of North 9th Street. The parcel lies entirely within Benton County. The City currently supplies water services to the property. The owner has consented to annexation. This property contains a single family residence.

02-60 A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF 458 NORTH 10TH STREET

QUESTION: Shall 458 North 10th Street, 5.80 acres located north of North 10th and east of North 9th Street, be annexed?

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 5.80 acres of land zoned Low Density Residential to the City of Philomath. The property to be annexed is generally east of North 9th Street and north of the terminus of North 10th Street. The parcel lies entirely within Benton County. The City currently supplies water services to the property. The owner has consented to annexation. This property contains a single family residence.

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02-61 A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF 201 NORTH 20TH PLACE

QUESTION: Shall the 201 North 20th Place property, 1.46 acres located east of College Street, be annexed?

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 1.46 acres of land zoned Commercial to the City of Philomath. The property to be annexed is generally east of College Street. The parcel lies entirely within Benton County. The City currently supplies water and sewer services to the property. The owner has consented to annexation. This property contains a single family residence.

02-62 A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF 1020 NORTH 19TH STREET

QUESTION: Shall 1020 North 19th Street, 1.81 acres located west of North 19th Street and north of Industrial Way, be annexed?

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 1.81 acres of land zoned Light Industrial to the City of Philomath. The property to be annexed is generally west of North 19th Street and north of Industrial Way. The parcel lies entirely within Benton County. The City currently supplies water and sewer services to the property. The owner has consented to annexation. This property contains a manufacturing facility.

02-63 A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF THE NEABEACK HILL SUBDIVISION

QUESTION: Shall the Neabeack Hill Subdivision, 34.22 acres located south of Main Street and north of the Southwood Subdivision, be annexed?

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 34.22 acres of land zoned Low Density Residential to the City of Philomath. The property to be annexed is generally south of Main Street and north of the Southwood Subdivision. The parcel lies entirely within Benton County. The City currently supplies water and sewer services to the property. The owner has consented to annexation. This property is under development as a residential subdivision.

02-64 A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF PROPERTY AT 2651 MAIN STREET

QUESTION: Shall 2651 Main Street, .66 acres located north of Main Street and northeast of South 26th Street, be annexed?

SUMMARY: Approval of this measure would annex approximately .66 acres of land zoned Industrial Park to the City of Philomath. The property to be annexed is generally north of Main Street and northeast of South 26th Street. The parcel lies entirely within Benton County. The City currently supples no utility services to the property. The owner has consented to annexation. This property is developed with a cabinet manufacturing business.

02-66 PHILOMATH PARKS OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE FOUR YEAR SERIAL LEVY

QUESTION: Shall the City annually tax \$.16372/\$1,000 assessed valuation of real property for four years to provide additional parks maintenance funding?

STATEMENTS: This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent. This measure will last for four years.

SUMMARY: The annual collection of property taxes at the rate of \$.16372/\$1,000 assessed valuation will provide \$20,000 each year for four years to fund increased operation and maintenance activities associated with the adoption of the Parks Master Plan. The Philomath Parks Operation and Maintenance Serial Levy was a recommendation from the citizens Parks Master Plan Advisory Committee. The purpose of the levy is to supplement funding for existing park operations and maintenance as well as future parks to be developed under the Parks Master Plan. In addition to the requested levy, the Parks Master Plan Advisory Committee recommended that System Development Charges for new development be increased, and that the City commit to provide at least \$35,000 for parks operation and maintenance through its annual budget for each year that the levy is in effect. The taxes imposed by this serial option levy to fund the parks operation and maintenance activities are exempt from Ballot Measures 5 and 50 lim-



Pursuant to the federal "Voting Accessibility for the Elderly and Handicapped Act," Public Law 98-435, the State of Oregon has made the following provisions for voters who are elderly or who have physical disabilities:

- A cassette edition of the Voters' Pamphlet is available for Oregonians who cannot read standard print due to a visual or physical disability. To order a cassette edition of the Voters' Pamphlet, please contact Independent Living Resources at 503-232-7411.
 - If you need information regarding where you vote, please call your county elections official. All other Voters' Pamphlet questions should be directed to the Office of the Secretary of State at 503-986-1518 or 503-986-1521 (hearing impaired).
- 2. Large-type voting instructions or hand-held magnifying glasses for the visually impaired will be provided at each polling place.
- 3. Telecommunication devices for the hearing impaired will be available in each county elections office. The special telephone number for your county is included in the list of county elections officials that appears on the "Absent Voter" information page in Volume 1, or you may contact the Office of the Secretary of State by dialing 503-986-1521.
- 4. If an elderly or physically disabled voter's polling place is inaccessible, the voter may request, in advance, to have a ballot brought from the polling place to the voter's car, or be assigned to an alternative polling place.
- 5. Any voter who is unable to mark or punch the ballot because of a physical disability or an inability to read or write shall receive, upon request, the assistance of two election board clerks of different parties, or some other person chosen by the voter. Under no circumstances may assistance be given by the voter's employer, an agent of the employer, or by an officer or agent of the voter's union.
- 6. An absentee ballot may be requested by any elderly or physically disabled voter.

 and return to teaching children how to read, write and count. Teachers should be qualified by local school boards at the district




