-INFORMATION

GENERAL

Your official 1992 primary election Voters' Pamphlet is divided into separate sections for measures and candidates. Page numbers for these sections, as well as for the alphabetical index of candidates, are listed under the table of contents on this page.

Material in the measures section includes each state ballot title, the complete text of the proposed measure, an impartial statement explaining the measure and its major effect and any arguments filed by proponents and opponents. Where applicable, the ballot titles and complete texts of certain county and district measures also appear in this section. Oregon law requires the Legislature to submit one argument in favor of each measure it refers to the people. Citizens or organizations may also file arguments on measures by purchasing space for \$300 or by submitting a petition signed by 1,000 voters. The Secretary of State may not accept any argument which is not accompanied by the specified fee or the requisite number of signatures.

In the candidate section, partisan candidates appear before nonpartisan candidates. All space is purchased; statements and photographs are submitted by the candidates or their designated agents. The information required by law—pertaining to occupation, occupational background and educational background and prior governmental experience—has been certified by each candidate. Some columns are blank because Oregon law does not allow the placement of material relating to candidates for different offices on the same page of the Voters' Pamphlet.

Miscellaneous voting aids, including district maps, precinct and polling place lists, voting instructions, a complete list of state-certified candidates, and absentee ballot application forms, follow the candidates section. Another page, "Voting Accessibility for Elderly and Individuals with Physical Disabilities," contains information about provisions made for elderly or physically disabled voters.

The Voters' Pamphlet has been compiled by the Secretary of State since 1903, when Oregon became one of the first states to provide for the printing and distribution of such a publication. In 1909, the Legislature passed a law requiring pamphlets to include information on candidates.

One copy of the Voters' Pamphlet is mailed to every household in the state. Additional copies are available at the State Capitol, local post offices, courthouses and all county election departments.

> BE A WELL-INFORMED VOTER. STUDY THE ISSUES.

VOTER REGISTRATION

You may register to vote by mail or in person if:

- (1) You are a citizen of the United States;
- (2) You will be 18 years of age or older on election day; and

(3) You are a resident of Oregon.

IMPORTANT: You may register to vote if you meet the above qualifications, but you must be registered by 5:00 p.m. on April 28, 1992.

You must reregister if:

- (1) Your registration has been canceled;
- (2) Your name has been changed by marriage or court order;
- (3) Your residence or mailing address has changed for any reason; or
- (4) You desire to change your political party affiliation.

NOTE: If registered in a party, you may not change your party affiliation after April 3, 1992, to vote in the primary election.

You may vote one time in the precinct of registration without reregistering if:

- (1) Your name has been changed by marriage or court order;
- (2) Your residence or mailing address has been changed by the United States Postal Service, or city or county, but the location of the residence has not changed and you qualify for and obtain a certificate of registration from the county election office; or
- (3) Your mailing address has changed but the location of your residence has not changed.

You may cast a ballot even though there may be a question about the validity of your registration.

If such a question exists, the election official may require you to vote a "challenged" ballot. You will be required to sign a statement indicating you believe you are eligible to vote the ballot being issued.

The "challenge" process is provided by Oregon law and simply means your ballot will not be counted until the election official can determine you were entitled to vote. The election official has until the 19th day after the election to determine the validity of your registration. This process is used to assure no voter is denied the constitutional right to vote because of an administrative error and to make certain votes which may be fraudulent are not counted.

YOU MUST BE REGISTERED TO VOTE BY 5:00 P.M. ON APRIL 28, 1992.

VOTE TUESDAY, MAY 19, 1992 Polls are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

NOTE: At the 1992 primary election, a voter not affiliated with any political party may choose to vote either a nonpartisan ballot or a Republican ballot, excluding the office of precinct committeeperson. If you are not affiliated with any political party, please indicate your choice of ballot when you go to the polls or by marking the appropriate box on the request for an absentee ballot.

BALLOT TITLE

1 AMENDS OREGON CONSTITUTION: FUTURE FUEL TAXES MAY GO TO POLICE

QUESTION — Shall Oregon's Constitution be amended to allow use of future fuel tax increases, vehicle registration surcharges for policing of roads?

SUMMARY — Amends Oregon Constitution. The Constitution now limits use of motor vehicle fuel taxes and vehicle registration fees to construction and maintenance of public roads and roadside rest areas. This change would allow use of revenues from future fuel tax and registration fee increases for policing of public highways and roadside rest areas. New uses allowed only if taxes or increased fees are dedicated to that purpose. This change would not affect any taxes or fees levied or imposed before January 1, 1993.

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

PARAGRAPH 1. Section 3a, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, is amended to read:

Sec. 3a. (1) Except as provided in [subsection (2)] subsections (2) and (3) of this section, revenue from the following shall be used exclusively for the construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, maintenance, operation and use of public highways, roads, streets and roadside rest areas in this state:

- (a) Any tax levied on, with respect to, or measured by the storage, withdrawal, use, sale, distribution, importation or receipt of motor vehicle fuel or any other product used for the propulsion of motor vehicles; and
- (b) Any tax or excise levied on the ownership, operation or use of motor vehicles.
 - (2) Revenues described in subsection (1) of this section:
- (a) May also be used for the cost of administration and any refunds or credits authorized by law.
- (b) May also be used for the retirement of bonds for which such revenues have been pledged.
- (c) If from levies under paragraph (b) of subsection (1) of this section on campers, mobile homes, motor homes, travel trailers, snowmobiles, or like vehicles, may also be used for the acquisition, development, maintenance or care of parks or recreation areas.
- (d) If from levies under paragraph (b) of subsection (1) of this section on vehicles used or held out for use for commercial purposes, may also be used for enforcement of commercial vehicle weight, size, load, conformation and equipment regulation.
- (3) Revenues described in subsection (1) of this section may also be used for policing of public highways, roads, streets and roadside rest areas in this state if the revenues result from a tax or excise levied or imposed on or after January 1, 1993, that is specifically dedicated to that purpose and that is additional to any tax or excise described in subsection (1) of this section that is in effect on the effective date of this subsection. An agency may not collect any registration fee surcharge upon registration or renewal of registration of a motor vehicle if moneys from the surcharge are statutorily

dedicated to policing activities unless the surcharge is imposed by a law that is enacted after January 1, 1993.

PARAGRAPH 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election held throughout this state on the same date as the next regular primary election.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Section 3a of Article IX of the Oregon Constitution deals with permissible uses of revenues derived from motor vehicle fuel taxes and from taxes and excises imposed on the ownership, operation or use of a motor vehicle, including motor vehicle registration and titling, and issuance and renewal of driver licenses and permits. Such revenues may be used only for purposes such as highway construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, maintenance, operation and use, for related administrative expenses and for the retirement of related bonds. In addition, moneys from taxes or excises levied on specific vehicles may also be used for specific purposes related to those vehicles.

This measure would amend Section 3a, Article IX to allow revenue from taxes on motor vehicle fuel and from taxes or excises levied on motor vehicle ownership, operation or use to be used for policing of highways, streets, roads and roadside rest areas. This use would be allowed only if the revenues result from a tax or excise that is specifically dedicated to these purposes, that is levied or imposed after January 1, 1993, and that is additional to any tax or excise already in effect on the effective date of the measure. The measure itself imposes no taxes. If a new tax or excise meets the specified criteria, the revenues may be used exclusively for these policing activities.

ARGUMENT IN SUPPORT

INCREASE OUR HIGHWAY SAFETY OPTIONS

Safety on our highways is a major concern for all Oregonians. Even with some of the toughest laws in the country, Oregon continues to rank among the top 20 states in fatal accidents. One factor contributing to highway safety problems is inadequate law enforcement.

Prior to 1980, state highway patrols were funded through gas taxes and vehicle fees, including truck taxes. A constitutional amendment passed that year removed highway patrol from this traditional source of funding. Since then, highway patrol dollars have come from the General Fund. Competition for General Fund dollars has stiffened and allocations to the State Police have not been nearly adequate. Since 1980, patrol division staffing has decreased by 223 positions, and patrol hours have been cut in half. These dramatic declines came over the same years that have a 22% increase in the licensed driver population and a staggering 40% increase in vehicle miles travelled in the state. These are startling trends.

Over 7,000 persons have lost their lives on Oregon highways since 1980, and the cost of traffic accidents is estimated by the State Police to have exceeded \$8 billion! Two main contributing factors, drunk driving and speed, can effectively be reduced by increased highway patrols, along with education and strong sanctions.

Ballot Measure 1 will change the state constitution to allow all or a portion of fuel tax or vehicle fee increases to be used for highway policing, if the funds are dedicated to this purpose.

Ballot Measure 1 will not diminish existing funding for highway construction and maintenance. The measure was carefully written to protect existing fees for state and local highway uses.

Passage of Ballot Measure 1 will not automatically increase fees, but will allow dedication of fuel or vehicle fee increases to highway patrol. There will also be the ability to designate a portion of those increases to city and county traffic patrols.

We urge you to vote "yes" for Ballot Measure 1. Help return to law enforcement agencies the ability to enhance enforcement and safety through increased traffic patrols. Dollars invested can save both the cost of accidents and the lives of Oregonians.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

For years, Oregonians have said we are willing to pay for police patrols if we are sure that's where our money is going. Ballot Measure #1 will give us that opportunity.

A "yes" vote on Measure #1 will allow future fuel and vehicle registration fees to be dedicated for patrolling roads. It also eliminates this funding from the income tax-supported State General Fund.

Measure #1 does not take one dime away from the Highway Fund dedicated to road construction and repair. This funding will continue with or without passage of Measure #1.

Since 1980, the number of Oregon state troopers patrolling the highways and secondary roads have been cut by over one-third. Why? Because police budgets have been cut in order to fund other less essential services. Now, there is not even enough money to maintain current, minimal police patrols.

Measure #1 gives us the opportunity to tell the legislature how we want our tax dollars spent. It makes sense to have all motorists on Oregon's roads—including those from out-of-state—help pay for enforcement of DUII and speeding laws through a fund dedicated to police.

This is our chance to stop further cuts in traffic safety and spread the costs among all who use Oregon's roads. A "yes" vote on Measure #1 is our chance to make Oregon a safer place to drive.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

Our organization is made up of Oregon State Police officers. We hope you will vote "yes" for Ballot Measure #1. Here's why:

- Budget cuts have forced the reduction of more than two hundred Oregon State Police Patrol Division officers since 1980. Less that 450 officers are left to patrol the entire state.
- Twenty-four hour coverage is impossible in many areas of the state due to the lack of officers.
- Aid to travelers has dropped by over 40 percent on secondary roads and over 20 percent on freeways.
- Drunk drivers and high-speed drivers are the major cause of traffic accidents, injuries and deaths. More officers are needed if we are to control violators who hurt law-abiding drivers.

In nearly every traffic safety service we provide, from helping stranded motorists to stopping the drunk drivers, our services are down dramatically. These services have decreased 25 to 50 percent in just over ten years, while traffic continues to increase.

This is not our choice. It is deeply frustrating to us. We care about saving lives and improving traffic safety. It's our job to help make the roads safer through law enforcement. We know that active, visible enforcement of traffic safety laws will reduce needless death and injury.

Before 1980, State Police patrol funding was paid by highway users. It wasn't part of politics as usual, as it is now. Measure #1 would give us back dedicated funding that no one can tamper with. We urge a "yes" vote on Measure #1 so we can do our job—protecting Oregon's drivers and passengers—the way it ought to be done.

ARGUMENT IN OPPOSITION

THE COMMITTEE FOR GOOD OREGON ROADS

Before 1980, the Oregon Constitution allowed road user taxes to be spent for certain parks, police, recreational and historic purposes. Oregon roads were going to pot because of a lack of adequate funding. In 1980, Oregonians voted overwhelmingly to amend our State Constitution to require that our gasoline taxes be used for the roads upon which we drive.

City, county and state highway programs have benefited from this Constitutional provision. Motorists throughout Oregon have benefited. Overall, the roads, highways and bridges in Oregon are in better condition today than they were twelve years ago.

Now, on the heels of Ballot Measure 5, there are some that believe Oregon should use your road fund taxes to support general fund programs such as police and parks. Ballot Measure 1 asks you to amend the Oregon Constitution to allow funding of police from your future gas taxes. Later this year in the General Election, Oregonians will be asked again to amend the Constitution to allow fuel taxes to be used for parks. These amendments would undo what the majority of Oregonians decided in 1980.

ARGUMENT IN OPPOSITION

GOOD ROADS IMPROVE OUR QUALITY OF LIFE

A "no" vote on Ballot Measure One is a vote for improved mobility and a better quality of life in Oregon. As a result of constitutionally protecting the state's dedicated highway fund in 1980, Oregon has been able to accommodate a 35 percent increase in highway travel over the past 10 years by increasing highway investment by over 50 percent. This investment in our future continues to create jobs and stimulate economic growth.

With Oregon's population growing by approximately 1,800 residents a month, we need to insure the state's ability to provide safe and efficient highways. Road and bridge funding must be able to keep pace with the increased demands we are placing on the system.

By allowing state lawmakers to take motorist user fees — your gas taxes — away from road and bridge improvements, Oregonians could face the kind of gridlock that motorists face in Seattle. Clogged roads and bridges would result in longer commutes, higher prices for products and reduced traffic safety.

DEDICATED GAS TAXES SAVE OREGON MOTORISTS' MONEY

Don't turn back the clock to an era when Oregon failed to adequately maintain our road and bridge network. Vote "no" on Ballot Measure 1.

In 1980, the average Oregon driver spent an extra \$233 a year in wasted motor-fuel, excessive tire wear and added vehicle repairs because 70 percent of the state's most heavily traveled roads were substandard, according to The Road Information Program (TRIP).

By voting to protect the state's dedicated highway fund constitutionally in 1980, Oregonians substantially improved the condition of our roads. 

Edmund G. (Jerry) Brown Jr. was born in San Francisco on April 7, 1938. He graduated from St. Ignatius High School in that city, studied for the Catholic priesthood at the Sacred Heart Novitiate, a Jesuit seminary, and received his B.A. degree in the classics from the University of California at Berkeley in 1961. He graduated from Yale Law School in 1964, clerked for a justice of the California Supreme Court and practiced law with the Los Angeles firm of Tuttle and Taylor.

Jerry Brown, the son of former California Governor Edmund G. (Pat) Brown, got his first active taste for politics — apart from his father's campaigns — in U.S. Senator Eugene McCarthy's 1968 anti-war campaign for President in California.

The next year Brown was elected to a seat on the Los Angeles Community College District Board of Trustees, and in 1970 he was elected Secretary of State of California, the only Democrat to win a statewide office as Ronald Reagan won reelection and swept all other statewide Republicans into office.

As Secretary of State, Brown drastically tightened, over the opposition of the Democratically controlled legislature, campaign disclosure laws. When the state legislature refused to adopt more stringent reforms, Brown authored Proposition 9, a ballot measure that limited the amount lobbyists could spend entertaining politicians, established a Fair Political Practices Commission to police campaign practices in California, and limited the amount of money candidates for statewide office could spend. The spending limit was later struck down by the Supreme Court.

Brown ran for Governor of California in 1974, in a race where San Francisco Mayor Joseph Alioto, Assembly Speaker Bob Moretti and State Senate Majority Leader George Moscone were considered putative front-runners. After winning the Democratic Primary, Brown went on to defeat Republican Houston Flournoy in November.

As governor, Brown emphasized environmental protection, development of innovative technology, and educational reform. During his tenure in office, California became the world leader in developing solar, wind and co-generation technologies. He dramatically expanded the role of women and minorities in state government, created the highly-successful California Conservation Corps, which has trained and provided 50,000 jobs for young men and women, and established an office of Appropriate Technology for the state. Decades after Steinbeck wrote about the horrible condition of farm workers, Brown pushed through the legislature the nation's first Agriculture Labor Relations Act, which gave farmworkers the right of collective bargaining. Brown expanded the role of state government yet reduced taxes and vetoed billions of dollars in proposed spending.

Brown was reelected in 1978 by the largest margin in California history. He received 1.3 million votes more than his Republican opponent, state Attorney General Evelle Younger.

Twice while serving as governor of California — in 1976 and in 1980 — Brown entered presidential primaries. In 1976 he won several primaries, but entered the contest too late to obtain enough delegates to win the nomination. His 1980 effort, against incumbent President Jimmy Carter, was also unsuccessful.

Brown decided not to seek a third term as governor in 1982, and instead ran for the U.S. Senate, losing to Republican Pete Wilson, now California's governor.

Following his defeat Brown traveled widely in Mexico and Asia, including living six months in Japan, and visited political leaders in both China and the Soviet Union. While in India, he worked as a volunteer with Mother Teresa at the Home for the Dying and Destitute. Later, he briefly practiced law and in 1989 was elected chairman of the California Democratic Party, a post he resigned in March 1991 to pursue a possible campaign for the U.S. Senate. During the summer Brown announced that he was abandoning the Senate race, even though polls showed him the front-runner, to explore a possible campaign for President.

Our democracy has been taken over by a greedy and incompetent Alliance — big campaign donors, lobbyists, and corporate executives, who pay themselves 100 times more than their workers whose jobs, pay and health care they have sacrificed. Without shame they are driving America into economic decline while they prosper at the expense of the rest of us.

The Alliance survives because they are protected by the Incumbent Politicians of both parties who betray the public interest for the massive financial support re-election requires. They are the Incumbent Party — whose first goal is re-election.

This election is not just about changing Presidents. It is about changing the country. America's critical problems can only be collectively solved by the American people. Americans — each of us — must take back our democracy and act to change this country we love.

I would abolish the "gag rule" for federally funded family planning clinics the day I took office and in a Clinton Administration, pregnancy related procedures, including abortion, would be covered under the proposed national health care plan.

Eliminate the waste inherent in our health care system.

If present trends continue, by the end of the decade the U.S. will spend more than 17% of its GNP on health care costs, enough to consume the peace dividend and make it impossible to be fully competitive in the global economy.

The Clinton Health Plan has five main parts:

- 1. Guarantee universal coverage
- 2. Control costs
- 3. Concentrate on preventive and primary care
- 4. Expand long-term care
- 5. Intensify health education

I would also encourage creative new health care options, like a pilot program we began in Arkansas called ElderChoices. ElderChoices gives the elderly the right to take money previously available only for nursing home care and instead spend it on home health care, personal care, transportation to senior centers, hiring a nurse, or attending an adult day care center.

Unemployment for more than seven days for the entire nation need not be more than one-half of one per cent (50,000) for the entire country. Solve the problem of unemployment and many other problems will cease to exist. If it can be counted or measured, it must obey the laws of mathematics.

If necessary, the jobless could replace government workers beginning with those on the payroll the longest and thus most responsible for much of the problems of the country.

Anti-Bureaucracy and citizen participation is necessary for a representative democratic republic. No one has the right to feed at the public trough forever. No one should be on the public payroll more than five years out of any consecutive fifteen. Nor should any government pension exceed that available to taxpaying citizens. In-training would lead to faster promotions and better chances for better jobs on leaving.

Fundamentally, laws are to protect the citizen—primarily from the tyranny of governments. When something is done for one, something must be done to another. Complicated laws are bad laws. No person need be subject to more law than can be well printed in easily readable type, bound well on good paper, understood by any high school student, and carried three utility pole lengths by a normal five year old child.

Lpropose to take the government out of the hands of the few and return it to the hands of the people. To insure this end, I propose a Graduate School of Politology to educate and to train people from all walks of life for responsible effective elective office.

L propose to replace the insult to all Americans autocratic monarchial judicial system with its foxes and jackals guarding the henhouse, featherbedding, split families and friends system with a refereed arbitration and negotiation system designed to bring people together. It is illogical to expect decisions to be fair and honest by suppressing knowledge and evidence. Judges and lawyers, as officers of the court, should not be allowed to use their privileged positions to harass citizens.

Lpropose a single Federal probate system to be entered by choice of the decedent selected executor most of whom are once in a lifetime amateurs trying only to help an old friend or relative. They should be treated as such with compassion.

Citizens have the right to ask of the government anything for which they are willing to pay increased taxes. Pride dictates that no person should expect another to pay his bills, nor should he be expected to pay another's bills. All should be treated equally. All taxes should consider inflation.

Health & Economic Assurance are effective solutions to life's emergencies. Insurance companies are in the business of NOT paying claims. Who ever heard of a government program that did as much and cost as little as when first offered? My health plan would use NEMES to help people pay their own bills. My plan would begin with three books in every home on prevention and self-help. Loans, backed by life insurance and NEMES, could be made. Extension could be to homes, cars, and family farms.

Napoleonic touches are needed to reduce health care. I propose a tax-free one hundred million (or a billion) dollars to be reduced one-tenth each year to whomever comes up with a full complete instantaneous end to dental decay. Government would only coordinate activities and exert quality control.

Incontinence programs could halve nursing home occupancy. Save \$\$\$\$.

Timberers are hoaxed by plans to cut down our Oregon heritage. **NEMES** and true Economic Development R & D could give them real security and a better life. No one should cut down a tree older than his own great grandparents. Synthetic wood? Laugh not. Wood from air, water, catalysts, and a little sunlight.



HEALTHY FORESTS AND NEW WOOD PROCESSING JOBS

For years the Pacific Yew tree was burned as trash on National Forest clearcuts. Now it is in short supply as a life-saving cancer cure. I favor a conservative forest policy. We must not measure a forest's value by its log output, nor fail to protect its biological diversity.

Replacing native forests with tree farms damages soil, endangers our water supply and leaves woodlands vulnerable to fire and disease. For a steady flow of forest products, we must conserve and sustain old growth forests, and keep them close to their natural state. We need not clearcut.

Many Oregon communities depend on wood products for a living. The federal forests were to provide the timber but they will no longer. Oregonians are left without jobs. We must not fail them.

This transition requires patience and a willingness to look beyond the old jobs. We should favor labor-intensive secondary wood processing. Oregon can manufacture modular homes, hardwood furniture and specialized building components. The Japanese will buy metric lumber from us, and twice the workers will work each log processed for that market. These are ways to get more jobs from each tree.

EASTERN OREGON

One of the most beautiful landscapes on earth is facing destruction by high-impact gold mining. The 1872 Mining Act permits powerful mining interests, many foreign-owned, to employ massive rock crushers, cyanide and financial giveaways to pursue the most marginal ore deposits. The land, our sacred heritage, is destroyed.

Some mining claims return double the cost of extraction; no royalties are collected. I would impose a penalty for each ton of natural rock disturbed. Those who would destroy Oregon's mountains for a few flecks of gold should be dissuaded. Minerals are non-renewable and mining is economically non-sustainable.

ECONOMIC DIGNITY

Our future requires a different tax philosophy. We must avoid taxing labor, commerce, homes and productive investments. I favor a \$50,000 property tax exemption for improvements to land.

As taxation ceases, government must also stop giving away the commons. We must collect equitable fees for the use of godgiven or community-created opportunities. This includes land sites, natural resources and the right to dispose of waste.

CAMPAIGN REFORM

I will not solicit donations, nor will I accept any over \$50. I will fund my campaign with personal earnings and spend no more than \$5000. I challenge all my opponents to match these limits.

Oregon has the best voter's pamphlet, an inquisitive news media and countless opportunities for the candidates to meet the people. We don't need multi-million dollar campaigns to tell us who to elect.

Let's limit terms on U.S. Congressional Committees, starting with Appropriations and the Senate Finance Committee. Not rotating the members of powerful committees means corrupt incumbents are reelected through special interest contributions.

FREEDOM

Democracy and the defense of individual liberty must be the aim of our foreign policy. We must not fail those who struggle for freedom in Kurdistan, Haiti or Tibet. We must not forget Tienanmen Square.

I support Most Favored Nation status for our friends in the former Soviet Union; oppose it for the cruel tyrants ruling China. America must stand for freedom:

COMMON GROUND

Making peace means more than allocating the sacrifices. The adversaries must find something to work together on. In the Middle East, people yearn for democracy.

Israel needs to uphold and respect the democratic values that caused Western nations to support her. Jailed Israeli peace activists should be released. The voters of Palestinian communities must be sovereign; their elected representatives must be respected, not deported. West Bank water must be equally shared. No nation that discriminates by race or religion can lead the way to peace.

HHL

We must get beyond the divisive abortion debate. I will not be taking money from anyone lobbying for either side of this polarized issue.

I oppose devaluing any and all animate life, be it unborn children, dolphins and porpoises, or the spotted owl. Let us respect life and discourage its taking, but without compelling adherence to the doctrine of any one religion.

Instead of banning demonstrations and gagging the advocates of opposing viewpoints in the abortion debate, let us foster greater communication of everyone's views.

My religion tells me every child has the right to a mother. No one can compel a woman to be a mother, nor can she be barred from abortion.

CASCADIA

Each year the federal government takes a greater share of wealth from the Pacific Northwest. In return we receive fewer services, mandates for programs that have no federal funds and a continuing erosion of cherished constitutional rights.

National politics have sickened relations with our Pacific trading partners. Federal infighting has deadlocked the timber crisis. In the world market, two halves of a common region are pitted against each other by an obsolete border.

A sovereign republic encompassing British Columbia, Washington and Oregon would enjoy many friends and few enemies. People are localizing government and reaffirming democracy all over the world. It's time to start here.

There is only one answer to the economic problems of the US. It is export. The fiercely developing economies of SE Asia have made gigantic gains because of their export based economies. Other developed nations such as Germany and Japan owe their economic strength to export. New export oriented industry needs to be developed. Long term planning is necessary rather than short term decisions mandated by stock holders who want instant returns.

Unfortunately for the unemployed timber workers, the decision on timber has been made. Now new jobs need to be created and training made available for displaced workers in the timber, auto and steel industries.

SOCIAL SECURITY Concerns of seniors need to be addressed. Their incomes must somehow be protected from increasing taxes and inflation.

ENVIRONMENT Oregon and the United States is full of beautiful Natural Resources. The environmental concerns must be kept a constant, not something that can be changed according to the economy. If environmental issues are to be accepted, the impact on workers and business must be taken into account.



Precinct Committeeperson

STATE QUALIFICATIONS

At the primary election, Republican voters elect one Precinct Committeeperson of each sex for each 500 voters registered by January 31 as voters in their precinct. No person may hold this office in more than one precinct at the same time.

Those who wish to become a candidate for Precinct Committeeperson must file a declaration of candidacy with the department of county elections. No filing fee is required for this position.

Any person who has been registered as a Republican voter for at least 180 days may be elected by write-in for the precinct where they reside, or another precinct located in the same county. Write-in candidates must receive at least three votes to be declared a Precinct Committeeperson.

By the 17th day after the primary election, the county clerk will notify each newly elected precinct committeeperson. Those elected by write-in will receive an "Acceptance of Office" form which must be signed and returned not later than the 24th day after the primary election, when the term of office for all new precinct committeepersons begins.

If a precinct is combined, consolidated or abolished after a Precinct Committeeperson is elected, they will continue to serve on the County Central Committee until the next regular

If a Precinct Committeeperson resigns, changes residences outside the precinct, changes political party affiliation, dies or is recalled, the county clerk will remove their name from the official roll and declare the position on the County Central Committee vacant. The Committee can then select a Republican voter registered in that precinct, or residing in the same county, to fill the vacancy. The appointed committeeperson receives the same powers, duties and privileges as an elected committeeperson.

Except as provided in ORS chapter 260, a Precinct Committeeperson shall not be considered a public officer.

SPECIFIC DUTIES

Precinct Committeepersons constitute the County Central Committee of their party. This is the highest party authority in county political matters; it may adopt rules or resolutions for any matter of party government which is not controlled by laws of this state, or the state party.

Precinct Committeepersons are the voting delegates to the appropriate congressional district conventions of the major political party with which they are affiliated. Delegates to national conventions are selected at the district conventions.

An elected committeeperson who represents a precinct which is subsequently combined, consolidated or abolished shall continue to be a member of the County Central Committee until the next regular election for Precinct Committeeperson.

A vacancy in the office of Precinct Committeeperson occurs when the committeeperson resigns, changes residence outside the precinct, changes political party affiliation, dies or is recalled. When a vacancy occurs, the county clerk shall remove the name of the person from the official roll; declare that office of Precinct Committeeperson to be vacant; and notify the appropriate County Central Committee.

The members of a County Central Committee may select a member of the major political party who is registered in the precinct in which the vacancy exists, or an adjoining precinct in the same county, to fill a vacancy in the office of Precinct Committeeperson. The County Central Committee shall make written notice of the selection to the county clerk. The person so selected shall have the same powers, duties and privileges as an elected committeeperson.

REPUBLICAN PARTY RESPONSIBILITIES

Precinct Committeepersons constitute the County Central Committee of their party. They are the grassroots link between Republican office holders and candidates seeking office and the voters. The major function of a Precinct Committeeperson is to serve as a sounding board for voter concerns and represent the Republican philosophy within their neighborhood.

The specific responsibilities of a Precinct Committeeperson include:

- Communicating to Republican office holders and candidates the political feelings and concerns of your neighbors.
- Attending meetings, electing officers, and developing the platform – the county's list of issues and values – of your County Republican Party.
- Helping to register Republican and encouraging voters to participate on election day. Assisting with activities promoting Republican candidates for state, local and national elected office.
- 4. Attending a Congressional district convention held every four years – to select delegates to the Republican National Convention. These delegates, in turn, select the nominees for President and Vice President of the United States.

Republican Precinct Committeepersons are literally the heart of the Republican Party for the county, state and nation. Poor government is a result of good people doing nothing. Good government is the result of positive interaction between elected office holders and the general public. As a Republican Precinct Committeeperson you can facilitate good government . . . of . . . by . . . and for, the PEOPLE.





ABOUT THE JUDGE

He likes people and he likes his work. Taxpayers are usually pleasantly surprised to find a patient, listening judge who tries to avoid technical jargon in explaining the law.

He works hard to improve the court and the tax laws. He is currently Chairman of the National Conference of State Tax Judges.

ABOUT THE COURT

"IMPARTIAL". The Tax Court is a separate, independent court, part of the judicial branch of Oregon. It is not a part of or associated with the Department of Revenue, but is a true judicial court. It seeks to render fair and impartial judgments under the law. "All proceedings before the court shall be original, independent proceedings and shall be tried without a jury and de novo." ("anew" or "afresh"). ORS 305.425

JURISDICTION. The court has exclusive jurisdiction over all questions of law and fact arising under the tax

laws of the state.

REGULAR DIVISION. The regular division of the tax court is on the level of a circuit court. As in circuit court, the parties are usually represented by lawyers. Due to the technical nature of tax laws and the formal rules of pleading and evidence, taxpayers are urged to be represented by a lawyer in the regular division. Appeals from the regular division are directly to the

Oregon Supreme Court.


SMALL CLAIMS DIVISION. Taxpayers may elect to come into this division if their claims are "small". In small claims, hearings are informal and no technical rules of evidence apply. You do not need an attorney and you can be assisted or represented (within limits) by people who are not lawyers. For income taxes, "small" is \$2,500 or less (exclusive of penalties and interest). For property taxes, it is small if the assessor's real market value is not more than \$125,000 on that part you want to appeal (ie. land alone, land and improvements, or just improvements).

YOU CAN BE PROUD

Oregonians can be proud of their tax court. Since its establishment in 1961, it has earned nationwide recognition and serves as a model for other states.





Congressional Map


BENTON CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS

VOTING ACCESSIBLITY FOR ELDERLY AND INDIVIDUALS WITH PHYSICAL DISABILITIES

Pursuant to the federal "Voting Accessibility for the Elderly and Handicapped Act," Public Law 98-435, the State of Oregon has made the following provisions for voters who are elderly or who have physical disabilities:

- 1. A cassette edition of the Voters' Pamphlet is available for Oregonians who cannot read standard print due to a visual or physical disability. For information regarding eligibility, please contact the Oregon State Library, Talking Book and Braille Services, State Library Building, Salem, Oregon 97310-0645 or call Portland: 224-0610; Salem: 389-3849; or toll free: 1-800-452-0292. Please use these numbers only if ordering a cassette edition of the Voters' Pamphlet. If you need information regarding where you vote, please call your county elections official. All other Voters' Pamphlet questions should be directed to the Office of the Secretary of State at 378-4144 or 378-5812 (hearing impaired).
- 2. Large-type voting instructions or hand-held magnifying glasses for the visually impaired will be provided at each polling place.
- 3. Telecommunications devices for the hearing impaired will be available in each county elections office. The special telephone number for your county appears at the top of the polling place list in the back of this pamphlet, or you may contact the Office of the Secretary of State by dialing 378-5812.
- 4. If an elderly or physically disabled voter's polling place is inaccessible, the voter may request, **in advance**, to have a ballot brought from the polling place to the voter's car, or to be assigned to an alternative polling place.
- 5. Any voter who is unable to mark or punch the ballot because of a physical disability or an inability to read or write shall receive, upon request, the assistance of two election board clerks of different parties or of some other person chosen by the voter. Under **no** circumstances may assistance be given by the voter's employer or an agent of the employer or by an officer or agent of the voter's union.
- 6. A special absentee ballot may be requested by any elderly or physically disabled voter. This request, **once made**, remains in effect for each election held in the same calendar year.

Details concerning the **nature of barriers** present **at polling places** designated as inaccessible can be obtained by contacting your county elections official.

If you have any questions about which candidates you are eligible to vote for at the next election, please call your county clerk. Some of the polling places designated here as inaccessible to elderly or physically disabled voters may be accessible by election day. Check published lists of polling places in your local newspaper just prior to election day, or call your county clerk for specific information on your polling place. Hearing impaired persons may call 757-6756 for assistance.





ABSENT VOTER

You may apply for an absentee ballot from your county clerk if:

- 1. You are a registered voter, and
- 2. You have reason to believe you will be unable, for any reason, to vote at the polling place on election day.

Your application must be in writing and must include:

- Your signature. (This is required, for comparison to your voter registration card.)
- 2. Your residence address.
- 3. The address to which the ballot should be mailed, if different from your residence.

YOUR VOTED ABSENTEE BALLOT MUST BE RECEIVED IN THE OFFICE OF YOUR COUNTY CLERK NOT LATER THAN 8:00 P.M. THE DAY OF THE ELECTION, MAY 19,1992.

If a registered voter is physically disabled, the application is valid for every election held during the calendar year for which the application is received.

While you may apply for and receive an absentee ballot up to 8:00 p.m. on election day, if your application is received by the county clerk after May 14, 1992, the county clerk is not required to mail your ballot. If your ballot is not mailed, you must obtain it in person from the county clerk. Therefore, if you apply for an absentee ballot by mail, you must allow enough time to receive the ballot, vote, and return the ballot to the county clerk. REMEMBER: Your voted absentee ballot must be physically in the office of the county clerk by 8:00 p.m. on the day of the election, May 19, 1992, or it will not be counted.

LONG TERM ABSENT VOTER

You may apply for long term absent voter status with your county clerk or the Secretary of State if:

- You are a resident of this state, absent from your place of residence, and
- 2. You are serving in the armed forces or merchant marine of the United States, or
- 3. You are temporarily living outside the territorial limits of the U.S. and the District of Columbia, or
- 4. You are a spouse or dependent of a long term absent voter. A spouse or dependent of a long term absent voter, not previously a resident of this state who intends to reside in this state, is considered a resident for voting purposes and may vote in the same manner as a long term absent | X voter.

Your application must be in writing and must include:

- 1. Your name and current mailing address.
- 2. A statement that you are a citizen of the U.S.
- A statement that you will be 18 or older on the day of the election.
- 4. A statement that your home residence has been in this state for more than 20 days preceding the election, and giving the address of your last home residence.
- A statement of the facts that qualify you as a long term absent voter.
- 6. A statement that you are not requesting a ballot from any | CITY other state and are not voting in any other manner than | by absentee ballot.
- A designation of your political affiliation if you wish to vote in a primary election.

The U.S. Department of Defense provides standard form 76 that complies with these requirements. It is recommended that long term absent voters use this form—available at embassies and military installations—whenever possible.

Your long term absentee ballot application will be valid for all elections held in the calendar year for which it is received.

Special absentee voting instructions and a ballot return envelope will accompany each absentee ballot.

Special Absentee Ballots: Any long term absentee voter may obtain a special absentee ballot for a primary or general election if the voter believes that:

- The voter will be residing, stationed or working outside the territorial limits of the United States and the District of Columbia; and
- The voter will not be able to receive, vote and return a regular absentee ballot by normal mail delivery within the period provided for absentee voting.

If you feel you may need a special absentee ballot, you should contact your county election officer for details.

REMEMBER, YOUR ABSENTEE BALLOT MUST BE RECEIVED BY YOUR COUNTY CLERK NO LATER THAN 8:00 P.M. THE DAY OF THE ELECTION, MAY 19, 1992.
