VOTE

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VOTER REGISTRATION INFORMATION

To be eligible to vote in the November 5, 1996 election, a completed voter registration card must be on file with the Benton County Elections Division **not later than 5:00 p.m., October 15, 1996.**

YOU MAY REGISTER TO VOTE IF;

1. You are a citizen of the United States.
2. You will be 18 years of age or older on election day.
3. You are a resident of Oregon.

YOU MUST RE-REGISTER TO VOTE IF;

1. Your residence or mailing address changes.
2. Your name changes.
3. You wish to change party affiliation.

IMPORTANT NOTE; IF YOU HAVE MOVED OR YOUR NAME HAS CHANGED AND YOU HAVE NOT YET RE-REGISTERED, YOU MAY STILL BE ELIGIBLE TO DO SO. CONTACT BENTON COUNTY ELECTIONS OFFICE, 757-6756

VOTING INSTRUCTIONS

- Step 1: Sign Poll Book and receive Ballot with Secrecy Protector**
- Step 2: Take Ballot and Secrecy Protector to Voting Booth**
- Step 3: Use the Ballot Marking Instrument in the Voting Booth**
- Step 4: Vote by connecting the Head and Tail of the Arrow pointing to the Candidate of your choice.**

- Step 5 To Vote for a Candidate whose name does not appear on the ballot, write name on "Write In" line and complete arrow pointing to that line.**

- Step 6: Vote on Measures by completing the arrow pointing to either the "YES" or "NO"**

- Step 7: When you have Completed Voting, place Ballot in Secrecy Protector with Stub Portion extending Outside the Protector**

- Step 8: Ballot Box Attendant will remove stub, then you slide Ballot into Ballot Box and return empty Secrecy Protector to Attendant**

If an elector makes a mistake while voting or otherwise "spoils" a ballot he or she may request another ballot.

The "Sample Ballot" and Voters' Pamphlet may be used to assist electors at the polls. An elector may seek the assistance of the election board clerks, or someone of the elector's own choosing in marking the ballot.

ABSENTEE BALLOTING

Any elector wishing to vote using an Absentee Ballot must make such a request in writing, signed by the applicant. The application for an Absentee Ballot may also be made by "fax" machine. (757-6757)

In order to be counted at an election, a returned Absentee Ballot must be received in the Elections Office or at a polling location not later than 8:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

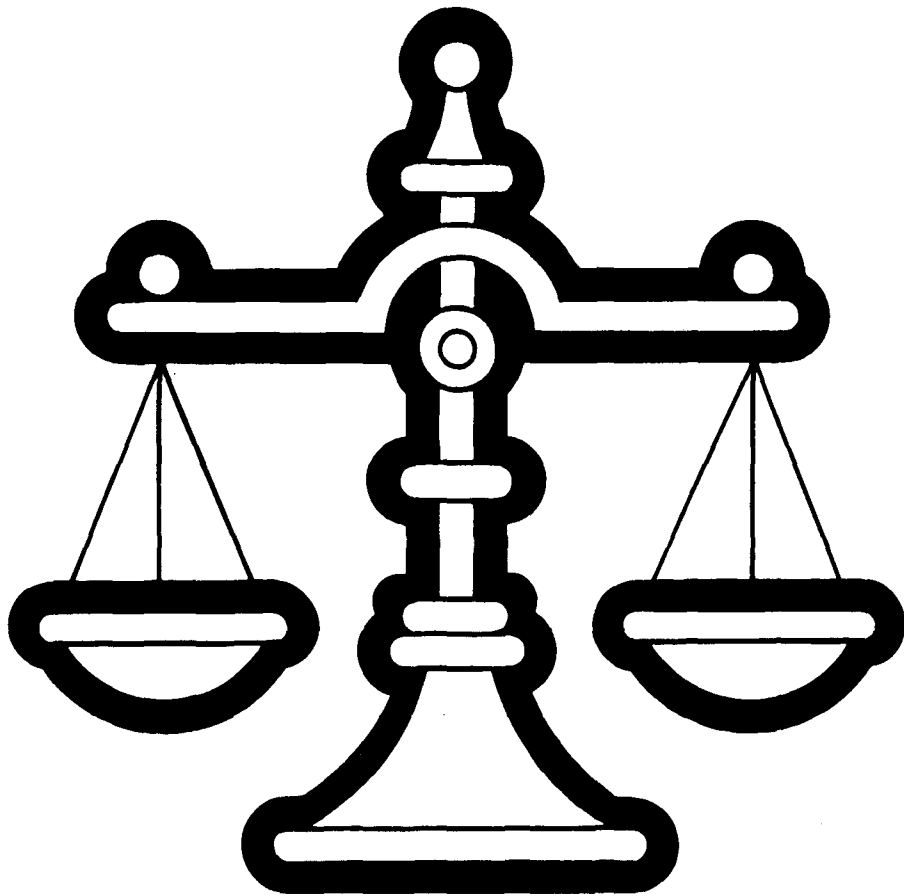

SUMMARY:

Approval of this measure would annex approximately 1.82 acres of land to the City of Corvallis. The property to be annexed is located east of Brooklane Drive and south of Chintimini Avenue, and lies entirely within Benton County. Upon annexation, the western portion of the property would be zoned RS-3.5, Low Density Residential. The remainder of the property, approximately the easterly 224 feet, more or less, will be zoned AG-OS, Agricultural-Open Space.

We are requesting annexation because the property has been denied septic approval due to a combination of well set-backs and a wetlands designation. Annexation would provide us with city sewer and water services. This is the only way we can be granted a permit to remodel the existing outbuilding and live on our property.

Approximately two-thirds of the property is covered in wooded wetlands and one-third is mostly open grass with a mix of fruit and shade trees. Our intention is to remodel the existing structure into a single-family dwelling and artist's studio. We will also be setting aside the majority of the property as a wetland and wildlife habitat.

Simply put, we are a local family, with a simple desire to have a home on what we consider to be our dream property. We stand for creating an environment that offers an experience of beauty, harmony and a sense of peace and playfulness.

SUMMARY:

Approval of this measure would annex approximately 41.5 acres of land to the City of Corvallis. The property to be annexed is located south of SW Country Club Drive, east of SW 49th Street, and west of SW 45th Street, and lies entirely within Benton County. Upon annexation, the property would be zoned a combination of PD (RS-6) and PD (RS-12), Low and Medium High Density Residential with a Planned Development overlay.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The 41.5-acre property proposed for annexation is located within the Corvallis Urban Growth Boundary, south of SW Country Club Drive, west of SW 45th Street, and east of SW 49th Street. Development for this area is required to be consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan which identifies the area as a combination of Low Density Residential (2-6 dwelling units per acre) and Medium High Density Residential (12-20 dwelling units per acre). The site would be districted a combination of PD(RS-6) (Low Density Residential with a Planned Development overlay) and PD(RS-12) (Medium High Density Residential with a Planned Development overlay). 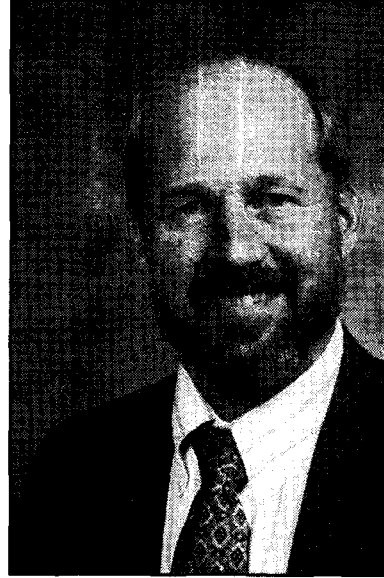

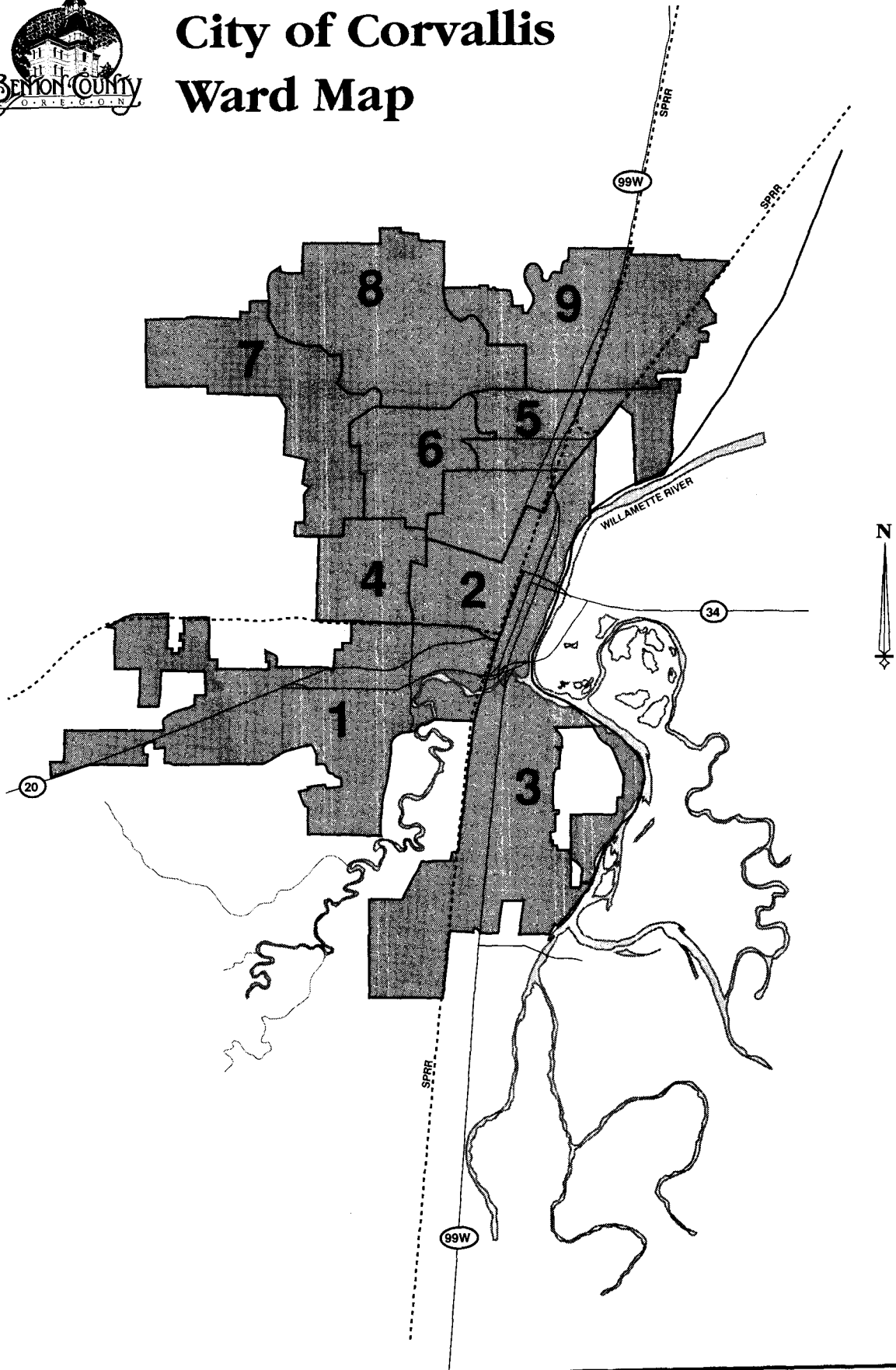

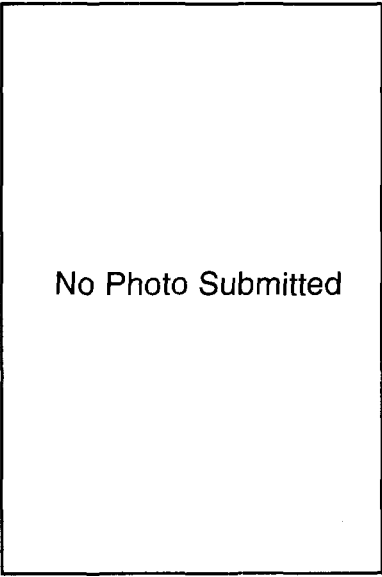
When we have a more effective Comprehensive Plan and better regional coordination, we should only authorize developments that clearly pay their full costs and to which the developer will make irrevocable commitments.
