


AMENDS STATE CONSTITUTION REQUIRES 3 ANNUAL LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS OF LIMITED DURATION

QUESTION: Shall state constitution require legislative assembly to meet annually instead of biennially and limit number of days in legislative sessions?

EXPLANATION: Amends Oregon Constitution. Requires legislature to meet annually instead of biennially. Changes commencement of session from second Monday of September to second Monday of January. Unless extended, limits length of session to 135 calendar days in odd-number years, 45 in even-number years. On two-thirds vote of each house, allows extension for five calendar day intervals. Requires multiple extensions to run consecutively, except for Sundays. Measures introduced and not passed in one session do not carry over to following session.

The ACRC will add space to hold up to fifty offenders sentenced by Benton County courts. The rest of the money will be used to extend city sewers to the County Fairgrounds, to buy property, and to fund new jobs in law enforcement. In the second year, the money will be used to pay for completing the ACRC, and for starting it up. After the second year, about 40 percent of the money will be used to run the ACRC. The rest will be used to maintain current services to make up for the projected drop in county timber money and inflation. The county tax base in the current fiscal year is \$6,547,610.
