1 PERMITS USING LOCAL VEHICLE TAXES FOR  
TRANSIT IF VOTERS APPROVE

QUESTION: Shall constitution allow voters of counties, trans-  
portation districts to authorize use of local motor vehicle  
tax revenues for mass transit?

EXPLANATION: Amends state constitution. Allows voters to authorize counties,  
public transportation districts to use local vehicle tax revenues for mass transit  
facilities and vehicles, including light rail and busses, in addition to highways,  
roads and streets. Use of local vehicle tax revenues for mass transit requires  
majority vote in county or district. Amendment affects only use of revenues from  
vehicle taxes levied by counties and districts. Taxes subject to limitation by state  
law. Legislature may require procedures for expenditure of such revenues on  
regional basis.

2 AMENDS CONSTITUTION; ALLOWS POLLUTION  
CONTROL BOND USE FOR RELATED ACTIVITIES

QUESTION: Shall state constitution authorize use of  
pollution and waste control bond proceeds for "activities  
related to" pollution and waste control?

EXPLANATION: Amends state constitution. Constitution now allows use of  
general obligation bond proceeds for pollution and waste control "facilities."  
Amendment would permit the additional use of such bonds for "activities related  
to" pollution and waste control. Constitution now requires that facilities, for  
which such bond proceeds are advanced, be at least 70 percent self-supporting  
and self-liquidating. Amendment would exclude, from this requirement, activities  
for which such funds are advanced and facilities for collection, treatment, dilution,  
removal and disposal of hazardous substances.

QUESTION: Shall state constitution require legislative  
assembly to meet annually instead of biennially and limit  
number of days in legislative sessions?

EXPLANATION: Amends Oregon Constitution. Requires legislature to meet  
annually instead of biennially. Changes commencement of session from second  
Monday of September to second Monday of January. Unless extended, limits  
length of session to 135 calendar days in odd-number years, 45 in even-number  
years. On two-thirds vote of each house, allows extension for five calendar day  
intervals. Requires multiple extensions to run consecutively, except for Sundays.  
Measures introduced and not passed in one session do not carry over to  
following session.

QUESTION: Do you want to change the current system of  
financing K-12 schools in Oregon?

EXPLANATION: Would advise the Legislature to work on major changes to  
Oregon's school finance system for kindergarten through 12th grade. Today,  
schools get most of their money from local property taxes. Property taxes pay  
an average of 57% of school costs. Statewide, property taxes for school opera-  
tions average about \$16 per thousand of property value. The state pays an average  
of 30% of current school operating costs from the General Fund, which comes  
mainly from income taxes. Districts also get money from some other sources.

02-5 TO ESTABLISH A NEW TAX BASE FOR BENTON  
COUNTY

QUESTION: Shall Benton County be authorized a new  
\$9,500,000 tax base beginning with the fiscal year 1990-91?

EXPLANATION OF MEASURE: In the first year, most of the money raised by  
this measure will be used to build the Adult Corrections Restitution Center  
(ACRC). The ACRC will add space to hold up to fifty offenders sentenced by  
Benton County courts. The rest of the money will be used to extend city sewers  
to the County Fairgrounds, to buy property, and to fund new jobs in law  
enforcement. In the second year, the money will be used to pay for completing  
the ACRC, and for starting it up. After the second year, about 40 percent of the  
money will be used to run the ACRC. The rest will be used to maintain current  
services to make up for the projected drop in county timber money and inflation.  
The county tax base in the current fiscal year is \$6,547,610.

22-11 TO ESTABLISH A NEW TAX BASE

QUESTION: Shall a new \$10,244,817 tax base be approved beginning 1990-91 to sustain costs of Linn-Benton Community College?

EXPLANATION: The Linn-Benton Community College Board of Education will continue to control taxes and will maintain programs within the new tax base until at least the 1994-95 year. The new tax base of \$10,244,817 is made up of the 1990-91 base of \$7,995,109 plus an amount of \$2,249,708. The added amount is to improve programs, provide for more students, and for delayed maintenance.

The tax base would maintain program choices at college centers in Albany, Corvallis, Lebanon, Sweet Home, and other towns.

The College provides access to programs that meet the needs of residents. It will focus on programs for employment, for new jobs and careers. LBCC also provides adult literacy and community services programs. The college will respond to new needs of the community.

02-6 CORVALLIS SCHOOL DISTRICT CAPITAL  
IMPROVEMENT LEVY

QUESTION: Shall District levy serially for four successive years beginning 1990-91 a \$1,912,606 annual tax outside constitutional limitation for capital improvements?

EXPLANATION: All revenue from this levy shall be used to enlarge and remodel district elementary schools and CHS library and to acquire related equipment. The total to be raised over the four year period of the levy is \$7,650,424 less uncollectible taxes. This levy will be in addition to and in excess of the amount limited by the Oregon Constitution except on vote of the people.

The student enrollment for the district has and is projected to continue to increase. The School Board has determined that district elementary school buildings need enlargement and remodeling and CHS library needs enlarging and that related equipment is needed for those schools. The board also determined that it is necessary to increase the district tax levy to provide funds for this work. This measure will provide \$1,912,606 per year for four successive years, beginning 1990-91 to be used only for the above purposes.

02-2 A MEASURE RELATING TO THE PROPOSED  
McFADDEN ANNEXATION

QUESTION: Shall the McFadden property, generally located north of Circle Boulevard and south of Village Green, be annexed?

EXPLANATION: Approval of this measure would annex approximately 65 acres of land to the City of Corvallis. The area is now surrounded by incorporated City and is generally located north of Circle Boulevard, east of the Whitson Acres subdivision, south of the Village Green area, and west of the Southern Pacific Railroad, all within Benton County, Oregon. The area is split by the future eastern extension of Walnut Boulevard. The area north of Walnut would be zoned residential, and south of Walnut would be zoned industrial.

02-3 MEASURE TO ESTABLISH A THREE-YEAR  
OPERATING SERIAL LEVY

QUESTION: Shall Corvallis levy \$1.00 per \$1,000 of assessed value for three years outside the tax base beginning July 1, 1990?

EXPLANATION: This measure authorizes a serial levy of \$1.00 per \$1,000 of assessed value to the City's tax rate each year, beginning 1990-91. The \$1.00 rate shall not increase during the time of the levy. The levy shall be used for general operating purposes of the City, including but not limited to, Library, Parks and Recreation, Police, Fire, Community Development and General Administration. The estimated amount of money to be raised each year is as follows: 1990-91 estimate \$1,107,000; 1991-92 estimate \$1,270,000; 1992-93 estimate \$1,340,000. This levy would expire June 30, 1993. The City plans to eliminate \$300,000 from its General Fund costs.
